MAITLAND AND CESSNOCK SIT AT THE HEART OF THE NSW MINING INDUSTRY AND HAVE BEEN IMPORTANT MINING TOWNS FOR OVER 100 YEARS. WITH A RICH HUNTER HERITAGE AND STRONG MINING HISTORY, THESE TOWNS ARE DEEPLY CONNECTED TO OUR INDUSTRY'S DEVELOPMENT, AND CAN CLAIM TO BE THE HISTORIC SPIRITUAL HOME OF COAL MINING IN THE HUNTER.

This strong mining heritage continues, with over 3,300 mine workers and their families living in Cessnock and Maitland, where they continue to be integral to the fabric of their communities.

Our local miners have endured some tough times over the past few years, yet our local mining industry has continued to make an important contribution, including in Maitland and Cessnock.

As well as providing thousands of direct local mining jobs, over 700 local businesses in Cessnock and Maitland have continued to supply local mining operations, sharing in over \$500 million in mining spending each year, even during the tough times.

And things are starting to look up.

In recent month's we've seen some signs of improvement for Hunter coal. The price of thermal coal has risen strongly this year, and the news is even brighter for coking coal, with spot prices reaching close to US\$230 a tonne. While it's still too soon to claim a 'recovery', there are more encouraging signs on the horizon.

The independent International Energy Agency (IEA) estimates that Australian coal exports will increase by 37 per cent by 2040. In particular, the IEA has highlighted the likely growth in demand in our region, as electricity generation from coal-fired power across South East Asia will increase from 32 per cent to 50 per cent.

In the same report, the IEA



highlighted that Australia, including NSW, will be set to significantly increase its share of the seaborne coal export market as a result of new power stations coming online across our region.

This is good news for Hunter mining towns like Maitland and Cessnock, as greater demand for our local coal means more jobs and stronger local businesses into the future.

The recent downturn in coal prices was severe enough to bend the industry, but would never be enough to break it. And that's because of the spirit, dedication and work ethic of our miners in the Upper Hunter.

for my mates and colleagues who are employed as casuals. I have seen an increase in the numbers of casuals in the industry in the work I do, with what started as contract and 'true' casual work but is now a culture of full-time casuals, fulfilling permanent positions. I'm not sure on the legalities around this, doesn't seem legitimate to me, but my concerns are for many casuals it doesn't provide them with the security that they need to put down roots in the community, buy a house or even get a loan. The trend towards casuals is concerning, would be great if you guys did a story on it or we got some perspective on what to expect and why. - Zak Mason Singleton



THE CMFEU IS FIGHTING TO PROTECT MINER'S RIGHTS TO FAIR ACCIDENT PAY AS WAS SET DOWN MORE THAN 30 YEARS AGO.

In the high risk industry of coal mining, accident pay is an award entitlement that our miners are undeniably deserving of, and this has been the case since it was introduced in 1973.

At its beginning, it was a basic 26-week entitlement awarded by the Coal Industry Tribunal. Then in 1980, it was substantially increased to a total of 78 weeks entitlement and this has remained the industry standard to this day.

We all know that accident pay works to "top-up" an injured employee's weekly wage. In other words, it bridges the gap between statutory workers' compensation payments and the normal weekly rate of the injured worker. And in the case of a miners wage this can be quite a substantial amount and heavily relied upon.

The accident pay clauses in the coal mining awards have operated without controversy for more than three decades. However, in 2010 with the making of modern awards, all awards that contained an Accident Pay Clause had inserted into them, a "sunset" provision that had the effect of deleting accident pay as of 31 December 2014.

The insertion of this sunset provision was not intended to do away with accident pay, but was based on the mistaken belief that by 2014 there would be a national workers' compensation scheme for

all workers and therefore, there could be a common accident pay standard for all industries. This was made in 2008, at the height of the Rudd Government's push for uniform OH&S and Workers' Compensation laws and we all know how well that worked out. So the CFMEU made an application in 2013 to delete the sunset provision in the new Black Coal

Mining Industry Award 2010 and in October 2014 the Full Bench delivered its decision and decided to grant the CFMEU application and the award continued to contain an accident pay standard of 78 weeks in total.

Then when the matter seemed concluded, in September 2015. submissions were again presented to the President of the Fair Work Commission by the Coal Mining Industry Employer Group essentially asking to re-open the award proceedings so that a lower accident pay entitlement could be inserted into the award.

The CFMEU and the Collieries Staff Union have objected arguing that accident pay in the coal mining industry has already been dealt with and the application was both unfair and impermissible.

Despite the CMFEU fighting the application, on 17 October 2016 it was decided that the case would go ahead. This is unlikely to be heard of until mid-2017, so it looks like a long battle ahead.

THE CLEAN COAL CRUSADE

NEW TECHNOLOGIES REALLY ARE CHANGING THE FUTURE OF COAL.

We know you've heard a whole lot about how evil coal is from unrealistic fringe dwellers and media sensationalists, but it's not quite the devil it's made out to be. Don't get us wrong; using it the wrong way and not adapting to new technologies is a recipe for potential disaster, but's that not the path the industry is on.

Nearly half of the world's electricity comes from coal and that demand is set to increase over the next 20 years. That's a fact no one can hide from or argue with. Here in NSW, over 80% of our electricity comes from the resource. No one can deny that use is going to change anytime soon. What we can and are changing now is how we use it as we move towards a more renewable future.

The World Coal Association wised us up on how dramatically things are changing.

It all begins with technology called HELE. So what is HELE? Simply put, high efficiency, low emission technologies developed to increase the efficiency of coal fired plants. They allow power generators to operate at higher temperatures and greater pressure while at the same time reducing by up to 40 per cent

of emissions generated per watt of electricity. So less work and better outcomes for more gain.

And what does this mean for us? HELE technologies can significantly reduce the amount of carbon dioxide and greenhouse gases being released into the environment compared to current methods. If every coal fire power plant

increased their efficiency rate to 33 - 40 per cent this could cut a staggering two gigatonnes of emissions annually. This is the equivalent to India's annual emissions or a hell of lot of the global cow farts that also add significantly to emissions issues.

Put emmisions safely back where they came from.

Carbon Capture and Storage (CCS) technology works by capturing CO2 as its being released, compresses it and then transports it to a safe storage site. These sites are geological formations deep underground. It puts the CO2 right back where it started from, just

minus the coal. Currently there are 22 large scale projects in operation or under construction globally that are leading the way in the future of coal.

With CCS and HELE technologies we can reduce emissions to more sustainable levels.

So what's does that mean for you and everyone else? Coal can, does and will have a future alongside renewables for more than a while yet, and with a bit of luck that means our jobs and maybe our kids will have a future within the industry here in the Hunter. So keep up the cleaner coal future you are helping to create every day.

The annual forum caps off a successful year for the Upper Hunter Mining Dialogue which has fostered greater community engagement and direct involvement between community and the mining industry.

The Upper Hunter Mining Dialogue uniquely brings together the mining industry with local residents, businesses, environmental groups and regulators to work together to minimise the cumulative impacts of mining.

BRINGING COMMUNITY AND MINING TOGETHER

To be held at the Muswellbrook Race Course, the annual forum will focus on the Dialogue's current projects like grazing trials, emerging issues and the future course of the Dialogue.

When Integra closed down their open cut and underground operations back in 2014 and ndreds of locals lost their jobs t was a devastating blow for the ommunity and the industry. But supporting the growing confidence in the industry the open cut mine has been newly acquired by the Bloomfield Group and is back n operation.

For the staff who lost their jobs when Integra went into care and aintenance it was a chance to ome back and many did just hat. In total over 1000 applicants applied for positions varying from operators to mechanical and electrical tradies, supervisors and environmental officers.

The Bloomfield Group Chairman John Richards said "It's very pleasing to be providing employment and economic opportunities when the coal ndustry has been facing so many challenges. He went on to say "The response from the community has been overwhelmingly positive. For 25 years Rix's Creek Mine has been working together with Singleton and surrounding communities and it's pleasing that we can take this relationship to another level."

The underground operations have been bought by Glencore who have yet to declare their intentions but we hope it will be back in operation soon.



40 years ago if you took a drive along Buchanan Road at East Maitland you would pass straight through an active coal mine washing plant site. Now you'll see grazing cattle and native forest and it's hard to believe that it's the same place.

The Bloomfield Group Chairman John Richards is proud that they are getting it right when it comes to rehabilitation. "It always gives us a sense of achievement when utilised land is tidied up and returned to natural form. It's almost impossible to tell what used to happen here, and that's what we always try to achieve whether it's an old washery or an old pit site."

The Bloomfield Group utilises

multiple rehabilitation techniques, including stripping topsoil ahead of mining for use in rehabilitation and backfilling in a manner to blend with the surrounding topography.



chooping down around Maitland this month @ The Coalface decided to pop in on Quarry Mining. If you don't know them, Quarry's a family business started over 34 years ago, supplying drilling consumables to mines. We spoke to Kari Armitage who runs the show, about business, the industry, life and what it takes to prosper these days.

Under Kari's leadership, Quarry has gone from strength to strength and now has 40 staff and operations in Beresfield, Mackay and Sydney. These days they service mining regions across NSW, QLD and Tasmania along with the current large tunnel infrastructure projects in Sydney.

"When I first got here Mum and Dad had dial up email which they'd check once a week and we didn't have a computer system so to speak," said Kari, "I met our General Manager, Phill Breese, an ex-underground miner, employed him and he hit the road. What we achieve together by helping our customers with everything from finding one small missing hose fitting, to providing a whole drilling solution or an innovative product to solve an industry wide problem is what has built this place."

To give you an idea of what Kari and Quarry is about, she told us a funny 'little' story; "On site one day with a rep, the site store manager says to him 'Is that little thing over there really your boss?' 'Don't let her fool you, she might look little, but she grows 10 feet tall when she's cranky! We know Kari to be one of

the nicest around, but she's a 'no bull' person to say the least, so we'd wholeheartedly agree!

She continued, "I love the teamwork that comes with being a miner. It's a hard job in a hazardous environment. I have so much respect for those who spend their days underground. I think it takes a particularly strong-minded person to do the job and I respect that a lot, and it's taught me a lot as well. You have to be tough.

2016 HAS BEEN THE TOUGHEST YEAR YET

"I hate that it went gangbusters and people got greedy when things were booming. People thinking they can just go in with no skill or experience and take home huge money was the wrong way. We've got the skill, the smarts and commitment and that's why we are still around and will be for a long time yet. Every day is a

huge challenge to make sure that this business survives in the mining supply chain.

"In the last few years there has been a real focus on our products and the mines are really squeezing the price out of us and everyone else. In many ways I understand it, they were under pressure so it's only to be expected we shoulder our share of the load. We saw it coming though and we had a bit of time to plan and build robustness into the business. You have to learn and never take it for granted. Complacency is your enemy.

"The biggest impact has been working out how to continue to

manufacture in our own back yard. Recently we've had to take some of our core products and make them in lower cost countries to be competitive. We are the last manufacturer of this type of mining drilling consumables left in Australia now and we are determined to keep as much of it here in the Hunter as we can.

"In 2017 we will be continually looking at R n D projects and are also branching out in to a different area of mining. Watch this space for some news on that in early 2017.

On top of this there are plenty of other positives on the horizon with Quarry signing a deal to distribute for blue chip drilling supplier Boart Longyear along the east coast of Australia. This association is a proud moment for Quarry and shows they are more than capable of competing with the big guys, particularly in the tunneling space. It couples well with their ability to manufacture customised products for hard rock drilling in house.

They also have a do it or die approach to innovation. From uni students working in house on their final year projects on never been done before stuff, to the guys in the field innovating with drilling or ground support problems and making crazy contraptions to solve problems.

On mentors and inspiration in industry there are three who really inspire her she told us.

"Stephen Galilee, because I admire his drive for the success of our industry and his ability to navigate what has been a very tough road with a heap of class and professionalism. "

"Tony Cade for his incredible inspiration when I felt 'It's all just too hard' he called me and we spoke about all things people like us do for the region. I didn't lose focus for minute in the 12 months that followed that conversation."

"Katie Brassil is that strong woman in my mining life as well as a great friend. She gives me a little dose of reality in the most delicate way when I need it. She understands being a woman in this industry and how not to make a fuss of that and just get on with it. She is always there when I need her."



Chris has a message he thinks everyone in mining should listen to - especially now that things look to be on the up. Diversify so you don't get caught out again.

Like many mining contractors in the region, it was sink or swim when things were a bit tough. Although they're only just beginning to get better now, the down turn also taught him a few lessons and created some unlikely opportunities that made sure they diversified in other ways to stay in the game.

DIVERSIFICATION SHOULD BE A KEY PART OF EVERYONES LONG TERM STRATEGY Chris relayed an interesting story to us, so we went out to investigate and see what he had to say. Not really knowing one end of a horse from the other, Chris told us about a call he got one day from Phillipa Burns asking if he could build a first class dressage arena. He said yes right away before realising he didn't actually have a clue. Mining earthworks are a little bit different he quickly remembered.

Chris went on to tell the story,

"Making a competition grade dressage arena wasn't something we'd normally do, or had ever even considered to be a legitimate opportunity, but with the assistance of an old self proclaimed surveyor in Bernie Wood, a bit of research and the operational skills of Darren Cully, we managed to put it together to a standard that surprised everyone. And we kept it all local to make sure the benefits stayed here. The job was done with help from Hebden Quarry, sand from Denman, and huge timber poles trucked in by Crawfords from Millfield making it a really great local project. You don't know where opportunities lie and while this wasn't a huge one we did learn a big lesson out of it. Opportunity is like coal; you just need to mine every seam to get the best value out of your business whatever the conditions.

While many are getting excited about potential mining opportunities on the horizon, now is also the time to plan for the future because industry cycles will always be a reality of life.

A HARD ACT TO FOLLOW

FEW COULD MATCH THE CAREER, ACHIEVEMENTS AND TIME SPENT IN MINING OF THIS BLOKE. WANT TO KNOW HOW TO GO THE DISTANCE? THIS MAN COULD TEACH YOU A THING OR TWO.

Reg Crick isn't so much well known in mining – he is mining. If ever someone bled black then it's Reg, and he wouldn't change anything, except one thing.

In 1964 Reg started a 52-year journey in Hunter Valley coal. Fresh from his leaving certificate he had a choice of options and chose to place his bet on a surveying cadetship at Newstan Colliery. He managed to get his Mining Survey qualifications in 1969 and looking to progress, he applied for a job as a mine surveyor at Bloomfield. Hard work and dedication met with a bit of luck as he studied for his

Undermanager's certificate in the 70s. Just as he became qualified, his superior retired and at the ripe old age of 23 he became Undermanager.

Having taken to this mining thing like a duck to water, Reg continued studying and got his Mine Manager qualifications around 1977 and true to form became Mine Manager at Bloomfield.

46 YEARS IS A LONG TIME TO BE A COALMINER!

A short 46 years later and he has done just about every job there is to do in mining. Enviro, human resources, industrial relations and public relations are all desks he's parked his feet under.

Reg said, "Being a smaller organization it allowed me to obtain a diverse set of skills. The underground closed in 92 but I was already in open cut by then. In 1989 when the Rix's Creek mine opportunity came up, I was fortunate to head up the team that presented the case to regulators and the public to open the mine. It was the biggest challenge of my career and I am very proud of what we achieved in the face of opposition and complexity. We have been very successful and enjoy terrific relations with the town despite being so close to the edge of town since we started. We set up the very first Community Consultative Committee that delivered a collaborative nature and open communications."

Reg continued, "Bloomfield has been a pleasure. They have always been innovative and progressive and I've loved being part of that."



Reg then became serious as he told us about the single most important thing. Safety performance. He has lived it in ways he wished he hadn't. And that's where the one thing he regrets was revealed. Though a long time ago, there have been five fatalities and that is something that's hard. It's important that the standards we have now are so good and are a great comfort to him.

Now a member of the board, General Manager of Mining and Business Development, it's onward and upward enjoying the daily challenges.

On a final note Reg proudly made the point, "One thing I've been fortunate with is to never have been unemployed because I've worked with a great company and people. I'm not sure too many can say that."

Holden fans shouldn't get too cocky, either. Sadly, Ford is the first of the big three Australian car makers to switch off the factory lights after the demise of the local industry was announced in 2013.

The finishing up at Ford also means it's the end of the road for the Ford Falcon, an iconic piece of Australian motoring history and culture, and the spark for plenty of heated

debate amongst Aussie rev heads, especially around the time of the Bathurst 1000. And this means those of us who support the blue oval badge and are lucky enough to own one will now be driving around in a collector's item.

It's a damn shame, because the latest model Falcon XR6 and XR8 looks the goods too. Sleek, stylish and mean as, unlike that sad looking nightmare model from the late 90s. You know the one we're talking about. The one that looked like the robot from

Short Circuit and had about as much head room as a bloody submarine! The Ford Falcon XR8 Sprint is an entirely different kind of beast, looking more like the T-1000 from Terminator 2, especially when the lights are on.

The Sprint's underpinnings are a development of the R-SPEC settings for the double wishbone (front) and multi-link (rear) debuted by Ford Performance Vehicles in 2012. There are new geometries and spring rates, re-valved ZF Sachs monotube dampers and staggered Pirelli P Zero tyres, instead of the traditional Dunlop Super Maxx rubber.

Armed with a bespoke Sprint version of Ford's supercharged 5.0-litre V8, and helped by an 'overboost' function, it packs up

to 400kW of power and 650Nm of torque, though, Ford's spec sheet quotes 345kW and 575Nm. It's the last in a long line of V8 rear-wheel drive sports sedans to be designed, engineered, developed and manufactured in Australia by Ford. It went on-sale back in May, priced at \$59,990 (plus on roads) for the six-speed manual and \$62,190 (plus on roads) for the six-speed auto.







We've all seen them on the television, those guys and girls that spend hours battling the currents in the water, endless cycling on the bike and then finishing it off pounding the pavement. And we all wonder what on earth makes them do it.

For Shane, it simply started with a wish to get into shape before his son was born. He was spending a typical

day on the lounge with a beer in one hand and the remote in the other when one of those do good get fit ads flashed up warning about the risks of diabetes and heart disease. For the first time, it hit home that he'd better do something to make sure he was going to be around for a long time. He pulled his rusty bike out of the shed, pumped up the tyres and so it began.





Which makes the annual Australian Mines Rescue competition a serious business. This year Rio Tinto's Kestrel Mine played host to the event, helping put 60 mines rescue brigadesmen from across Queensland and New South Wales through their paces. The competition did more than just decide the national champion; it provided Australia's most elite brigadesmen with the invaluable opportunity to test themselves against the best of the best, and reassure

the underground mining industry of their exceptional skill level.

The eight teams compete in a series of scenarios designed to mirror the reality of emergency response situations. The scenarios consisted of a challenging mix of underground and pittop scenarios. These included technical skills assessment, firefighting, search and rescue exercises as well as testing their first aid skills. A theory exam challenged the depth of teams' mines rescue knowledge and

Jess hasn't stopped there. When she was seven, Jess wondered what the kids in these families would do on their birthdays.

Her latest project is hygiene bags for homeless men and women. A good friend of Jess's passed away from bowel cancer and he was a strong supporter for everything she did. He wrote her a last letter telling her to never stop, so the Hygiene Bags are in his memory. With much needed basics, info on bowel cancer and a beautiful letter from Jess, they are available to anyone from Singleton to Maitland. Because of her work Jessica was the Maitland Junior Citizen in 2014 and spent two years on the Australian Day committee impressing all with her empathy and attitude

We know what you're thinking, no kid could achieve this all on their own. Well you're wrong. Jess's mum Angela said from day dot they've never pushed her to do anything, it was Jess who pushed them to do it.

Jess's dad David works at
Bulga and Jessica has grown
up with the kind of living

as Jess comprehended

have what she did so she

David said "Like most, we

thought it's just too big a problem, Jess showed us you can just chip away at it and make a big problem smaller."
