

It was also in early February that our industry's Resources Regulator confirmed a retired miner had been diagnosed with coal workers' pneumoconiosis or "black lung". It was the first case reported in NSW since the 1970s, but it illustrated to everyone the importance of work health and safety – an

area where there is never room for complacency. With around 21,000 people employed directly by the industry in this state, protecting our workers is a responsibility we take extremely seriously.




The NSW Resources Regulator is implementing the Mine Safety Regulatory Reform: Incident Prevention Strategy, in consultation with the Mine Safety Advisory Council and external industry stakeholders. This reform ensures that the regulator is delivering on the recommendations of the review and is modelling best practice and deploying resources to where they are most needed.

Programs such as the targeted assessment program are making our mining sites safer places to work. The New South Wales Government has also introduced practising certificates to ensure that our miners are competent in safety-critical functions.

MICK BUFFIER, CHAIRMAN OF THE WORLD COAL ASSOCIATION WAS AT THE HUNTER BUSINESS CHAMBER MINING LUNCHEON SPEAKING ABOUT THE OUTLOOK FOR GLOBAL COAL AND WE LIKED WHAT HE HAD TO SAY.

The future for coal is looking good, particularly for us here in the Hunter with an increasing global demand over the next few decades, particularly for thermal coal.

Currently, coal provides over 40% of the world's electricity and around 30% of its total energy needs. Although those figures are expected to drop, coal is forecasted to provide 23% of the world's energy needs by 2040, with the growth of energy demand over that period still

making coal a critical component of the world's energy needs. In 2040 coal is projected to be the second largest fuel meeting primary energy demand after oil.

Australian coal exports for both metallurgical and thermal are predominately Japan, China, Korea and Taiwan and India but we will see Southeast Asia grow in significance over the next decades.

WE NEED COAL FOR MORE THAN ELECTRICITY.

As Mick pointed out, even with the rise of renewables, you must consider that what all those wind turbines and electric cars will be made of. Coal provides 70% of steel and 85% of cement and as more of the world becomes urbanised the need for those products will grow.

THE PARIS AGREEMENT INCLUDES LOW EMISSION COAL.

With coal still around for the foreseeable future it is of upmost importance to make low emission coal a critical part of it. As Mick said, "I believe energy security, affordability and the reduction of emissions all need to be considered."

Around the world we are seeing more and more coal fired plants being built using High Efficiency, Low Emissions (HELE) technologies. Carbon Capture & Storage (CCS) will also play an important part in the reduction of emissions.

With two thirds of Australia's electricity generation gone by 2035 we need to follow the example of other countries around the world if we expect to meet our own energy demands.

Clearly, coal is not going anywhere so now is the time for our government to get behind the new technologies for low emission coal which will allow us to access and use coal more cleanly and efficiently, and position Australia to deliver a high-quality coal suitable for new generation coal plants and steel making to the rest of the world.

THERE'S PLENTY GOING AROUND IN THE COAL INDUSTRY WITH MINING JOBS ON THE RISE THANKS TO THE STRONG TURNAROUND IN COAL PRICES AND AN INCREASED DEMAND FOR OUR HUNTER COAL.

The most recent figures from Coal Services show there were just over 20,600 coal production jobs in NSW as at July this year - over 1,300 more than at the same time last year.

Many of these new coal mining jobs are in the Hunter, with over 1,000 more local Hunter coal mining jobs than a year earlier, helping to boost the Hunter economy, particularly in mining communities like Singleton and Muswellbrook.

NSW Minerals Council CEO, Stephen Galilee said the growth was also good news for the businesses across the state that supply mining operations.

"There's been a sustained recovery in business conditions for coal mining in NSW over the last 18 months, with increased commodity prices delivering jobs in our coal mining regions. Our NSW coal mining communities have done it tough over the past few years, so this jobs boost mining is really good news for local economies." Stephen said.



THE RECENT GOLD NUGGET DISCOVERY IN QUEENSLAND BY A LONE PROSPECTOR HAS GOT US WONDERING IF THERE IS GOLD WAITING TO BE FOUND HERE IN THE HUNTER.

A man discovered a 1.17 kilogram gold nugget valued at over \$60,000 in the bush near Townsville using only a metal detector.

Imagine if that rock you kicked out of the way in the dark as you headed back to your car after a shift was actually a golden nugget? What are the chances?

Not good. Disappointedly, when we researched where gold had been found in the Hunter, the closest to home we found was a nugget Merriwa in 1931. Experts in the field agree that the Hunter holds very little promise in the way of gold discoveries.

Yet in 2011 Perth-based mining company Gold of Ophir applied for 15 licenses to explore for gold covering over 4000 square kilometres from the Hunter, North West Slopes and New England. It abandoned those plans due to community pressure, but it does raise the question what do they know that we don't?

Call it a shameless plug or whatever you want, but we're keen to have a look at these emerging businesses, give 'em a plug, and inspire others to have go.

Starting a small business from home that involves making sure massive mining equipment gets on with the job takes guts, skill and determination.

David Komacha from DK Heavy Plant Services is one bloke setting an example we would love to see others follow. After building a reputation as a specialist digger fitter, in 2016 David decided to expand his 'one man show' sub-contracting company to employ others and supply specialist services to various mining companies in the Muswellbrook area.

Within the first few months
David had a workforce of around
10 people and was supplying
to Bengalla Mining Company
and EMECO International. By
six months David had increased
his workforce to 30 and was
supplying BHP Billiton. From
there he set up a large permanent
workshop and offsite facility in
Muswellbrook capable of handling
heavy earth moving mechanical

repairs for its rapidly growing list of mining customers.

David said, "Initially we were a small business that I managed with the help of the better half from home. We expanded rapidly and out-grew the home office and opened the large-scale workshop in Muswellbrook industrial estate. Currently the workforce sits around 40. We plan to expand even further with boilermakers for fabrications and repairs in the workshop and on mine sites."

David continued, "Recently we managed to complete a back to chassis rebuild of a D11 dozer in the DK workshop in 21 days for BHP Billiton. Both us and the client were pretty happy with that. It's all pretty satisfying at the end of the day."

Speaking to Dave his genuine enthusiasm and passion for the job was pretty evident. Attitude is nearly as important as the actual job and this outfit has the right kind. @ The Coalface hopes the future only gets brighter for Dave and his crew. We wish him plenty of luck, but as they say, 'the harder you work the luckier you get." DK's hard work is already paying off.

IGHTING FERALS

AFTER HELPING TO SAVE THE NORTHERN HAIRY-NOSED WOMBAT FROM EXTINCTION IN QUEENSLAND, GLENCORE IS NOW SUPPORTING A NEW VENTURE IN NSW THAT AIMS TO PROTECT OTHER ENDANGERED SPECIES.

Glencore's Community **Relations Manager Craig** Strudwick recently attended the launch of the company's newest community partner: Aussie Ark at Barrington Tops in the Upper Hunter.

Aussie Ark has opened its first 60ha feral proof 'enclosure' and with Glencore's support will be building an additional

400ha area that's being developed adjacent to the highly successful Devil's Ark project, a conservation breeding facility for Tasmanian devils.

APPROPRIATE FAUNA SPECIES ARE BEING INTRODUCED TO AUSSIE ARK TO BECOME SELF-SUSTAINING POPULATIONS. FOR SOME OF THESE SPECIES,

AUSSIE ARK REPRESENTS A RETURN TO NSW AFTER AN ABSENCE OF MANY DECADES DUE TO **HABITAT DISRUPTION AND INTENSE PREDATION BY FERAL PESTS.**

The species include the eastern bettong, which has been extinct in NSW since the 1920s, the longnosed and southern brown bandicoot, long-nosed potoroo, brush-tailed rock wallaby, Eastern quoll, Hastings River mouse and the Parma wallaby.

Craig explained that Glencore's Liddell site has been providing kangaroo meat to Devil's Ark for some time, but they wanted to do more.

"We decided to look at what we might be able to provide in terms of broader support, and we've now allocated funding to 'predator proof' the entire Aussie Ark enclosure. We're obviously keen to see Aussie Ark replicate the success we've had with our partnership with the Queensland Department of Environment & Heritage, which is rebuilding northern hairy-nosed wombat populations." Craig said.

First up was the recently completed Hunter River Water Quality Study that showed positive news with good water quality and an overall improvement in health.

We also heard the results from the Cattle Grazing Study which showed cattle grazing on rehabilitated mine lands could be sustainable, productive and profitable with cattle reaching bigger weights than cattle on comparable unmined lands.

The School Mines Tours Program is proving to be a huge success with students already out on site seeing mine workings up close. This ambitious project will see over 1000 students visit one of the 13 mines sites involved and plans are for

it to continue for years to come.

IN RECENT MONTHS WE'VE BEEN TAKING A CLOSE LOOK AT THE NEW SPUR HILL / DRAYTON SOUTH UNDERGROUND PROPOSAL TO SEE HOW IT STACKS UP. THIS MONTH WE WENT TO SEE HOW SERIOUS THEY ARE ABOUT IMPROVING HUNTER AGRICULTURE AS PART OF THEIR PLAN.

The key stakeholders of Malabar Coal led by Chairman Wayne Seabrook, have been running agricultural enterprises for decades. That history is already making a meaningful impact on how they are running their mining business in the Upper Hunter.

We took a stroll around Spur Hill's Merton Vineyard property near Denman with Spur Hill Agriculture Chief Consultant, Richard Webb, a grazier and former stock and station agent. We were also joined by Vineyard Manager, Rod Muldoon. Richard has been involved since the inception of the Spur Hill project

with the responsibility of looking after their agricultural interests. Rod has taken care of the day-to-day task of improving the vineyard to its best over the last four years.

Along with the vineyard, Malabar also run substantial grazing and hay making country, which they are not only endeavoring to maintain, but substantially improve to bring it to peak productivity. The actual grazing land owned by Spur Hill is around 4500 acres along with additional small farms that are managed by the original owners. If the Drayton South proposal all comes together as part of the Spur Hill plan, then the company told us that they will do the same thing with the agricultural components of that land.

Richard said, "The substantial grazing properties within the former Drayton South proposal would have been impacted by an open cut. However, as Malabar is proposing only underground operations at Drayton South this allows continuation of the agricultural activity and Malabar will set about improving the productivity of these Hunter farmland properties. The agricultural integrity of the land will be improved and is an integral part of how we want to do things and what we are about. Under the management of Spur Hill Agriculture, it will happen."

"BEING AS PASSIONATE ABOUT THE LAND AS OUR NEIGHBOURS MEANS THIS PLAN CAN WORK," SAID WAYNE SEABROOK.

is well underway from what we saw at the vineyard. They have actively gone about improving its productivity, grafting new varieties and also upgrading the infrastructure with new irrigation and improving the wine making facilities. A testament to that is wine maker Atsuko Ratcliffe's Small Forrest label that is produced there and is winning awards which they are all very proud of.

"WE ARE VERY PROUD OF WHAT **OUR PEOPLE ARE DOING. THE STAFF ARE REALLY MAKING THINGS** HAPPEN AND THEY ARE DOING A GREAT JOB," SAID RICHARD.

The team's talent has been further proven in the last month with viticulturist Liz Riley, who has been guiding the efforts in the Merton



vineyard, being awarded the 2017 Viticulturist of the Year by the Australian Society of Oenology and Viticulture (ASVO).

Liz said, "The ASVO is the Australian professional body for viticulturist and winemakers. It was a huge honour to receive this award, which has been judged by my technical industry peers.'

Talking to Rod who manages the vineyard supply to the winery as well as selling fruit to other premium wine makers in the Hunter he said, "I've been here 4 years. We get about one hundred tonnes of grapes in a good year and Malabar is passionate about the vineyard. They could have just ripped it out but that was never part of the plan. This place would have fallen apart without

the investment that has been made. Malabar have invested quite heavily re-grafting new plants and there's been a lot of money spent even though the returns aren't huge. We've been able to lift the quality to the point where we're forward selling our fruit into the premium end of the wine industry. People are ringing us for fruit now. The investment in varieties is really paying off."

RICHARD TOLD US THAT MALABAR WERE VERY KEEN TO ENSURE THAT THEY HUSBAND THEIR LAND PROPERLY, INCLUDING DRAYTON, AND THAT THEY BELIEVE THEY ARE PROVING TO BE GOOD NEIGHBOURS TO THE SURROUNDING PASTORALISTS AND FARMERS.

"With Drayton it'll be good country

that will happen to have some mining under it. We're really trying to improve the assets that we secure. Things like fencing, irrigation and equipment so that we don't see country languish and it becomes more productive than in the past. With Drayton South there's huge scope to improve that land and we look forward to that journey. The Malabar people have a keen interest in agriculture through their families and their own enterprises. They're not foreign to seeing the benefits of making things happen. The great thing about this is that there is genuine coexistence with the underground proposal. The agriculture elements can stay as they are and be improved as well. Using the Drayton infrastructure there will be no need to impact on the agricultural lands and that means a great future for this side of the operation." Richard said.

@ the Coalface believes it is all very well to talk the talk, but at the end of the day this plan needs to walk the walk. From all we have seen. the agricultural intentions of this company have already gone further than that and broken into a run. It's great news for them and even better news for any opponents worried about what the future might look like, and more importantly how they won't be affected.

FUNDING REHAB

THE ROLE OF MINING COMPANIES IN THE LONG-TERM REHABILITATION OF OPEN CUT LAND CAME UNDER DISCUSSION AT A RECENT MEETING BETWEEN SINGLETON AND CESSNOCK COUNCILS AND MINING NSW.

Mayor of Singleton, Cr Sue Moore and Mayor of Cessnock, Cr Bob Pynsent and Councillors from both councils, met with NSW Mining CEO Stephen Galilee and Policy Director Claire Doherty in Sydney.

They called for industry support for a fund to facilitate the best use of post-production open cut mined land and the need for research into the economic potential and environmental impacts, particularly of final voids.

A suggested solution could be that money paid by open cut mining companies to mine subsidence be redirected to the rehabilitation of open cut mining land. Cr Moore said yesterday's meeting followed similar discussions with NSW Minister for Planning Anthony Roberts on 24 October 2017.

"This is an important conversation that needs to be had and I appreciate both Minister Roberts and Mining NSW opening their doors to us, and for their support generally for the idea," she said.

"If a fund is established with sufficient resources, the economic and cultural potential of post mining land could become an asset for the people not only of Singleton and Cessnock, but NSW."

EDUCATION PROGRAM TO HELP IMPROVE SAFETY IN THE WORKPLACE. In October 2016, the **NSW** Department of Planning and Environment's Resources Regulator began an investigation into an alleged breach of the WH&S Act against Coal and Allied after an incident that occurred at MTW on 2 October 2014 which saw a worker seriously injured after falling from a grader. As an alternative to possible prosecution over the alleged breach, Coal and Allied submitted a proposal for an "enforceable undertaking". As part of the undertaking Coal and Allied have committed to a range of actions with a financial commitment of

already spent on works carried out because of the incident.

AN INCIDENT AT MOUNT THORLEY WARKWORTH IN 2014 HAS LED TO AN

A KEY COMPONENT OF THE UNDERTAKING IS THE **DEVELOPMENT AND DELIVERY OF** A PROJECT THAT IS TARGETED AT SCHOOL LEAVERS TO INFLUENCE THEIR THINKING AND BEHAVIOUR WITH REGARD TO SAFETY, BEFORE THEY ENTER THE WORKPLACE.

As part of the project an educational program incorporating a short film using virtual reality and a mobile app will be developed and trialed at two local schools. The project will be subject to an independent review and resources will be made freely available to create a long-term education program.

After careful consideration, the undertaking was accepted as it provided for significantly better outcomes than prosecution alone would achieve.

NSW Resources Regulator Chief Compliance Officer Anthony Keon said, "The undertaking by Coal and Allied is considered significant, and rightfully so, and has the real

Black Rock Motor Park is a major parallel economic idea for a mine site that might become a reality. Perfectly positioned to attract people from Sydney and the local region, Wakefield near Newcastle is in serious contention for a \$30 million car enthusiast resort, thanks to businessman Tony Palmer. Black Rock Motor Park is proposed for the old Rio Tinto

Rhondda Colliery mine site and is modelled on the famous Spanish Ascari motoring enthusiast resort and driving track.

The development plans entails a seriously impressive \$30 million car enthusiast resort with a 4km track, training facilities, a pit lane building for the open display of up to 60 cars and storage for up

to 162 cars, and user amenities including 20 short-stay villas, a 20-room lodge, function centre, café and bars.

The developer said there had been close consultation with Lake Macquarie Council since March 2016 about the proposal for Australia's first dedicated recreation resort park for motoring enthusiasts. Former racing driver Mr Palmer said Black Rock was aware of the opposition but didn't want to be a bad neighbour.

It would host corporate driving events and launches, driving "experiences" in performance cars, public track days and driver training with dedicated facilities.

"We will have a private track where people can train, where cyclists can have time trials and events safe from cars, and where there will be facilities in a beautiful environment," quoted Mr Palmer.

Who are you and what do you do?

I'm Danielle Goodwin. I work at Mount Arthur as a third-year apprentice plant mechanic.

Any nicknames good or bad?

I get called 'Sawn-off' because I'm so short. I'm probably the shortest out there in maintenance. Good things come in small packages I reckon!

Where do you live and how long you been in the Valley?

I'm in Muswellbrook and I've been there all my life. I went to Mussy High.

When did you start and what's the ride been like?

It's been pretty good; I got into the mines straight out of school. I always liked cars when I was young, playing around with dad in the shed working on stuff. I applied for the apprenticeship and I was lucky enough to get it. I finished Year 12 and started my apprenticeship in 2015.

What's a usual day at work entail?

At the moment I'm on heavy crew so it can be working on diggers, drills and shovels changing hoses. Sometimes we have trouble with the hydraulics and do a lot of diagnosis. You learn every day, which I think is great. I'm on the 24/7 roster, day shift / night shift.

How big is the crew?

I'm on a good crew and the blokes aren't too bad. On my crew there's 5 fitters, me and two leco's. Everyone looks after each other and has each other's back. One thing I've learnt though is that men gossip more than women. Stories travel faster

through them then the girls. Especially Pup. He loves it. **What's the**

best thing about your job?

The best thing is that you get so many different experiences and it's always interesting. It's just another world. People drive past and think it's just a big hole. But you're in there on these big machines that are just great to work on. I do like being on heavy crew as opposed to trucks and stuff. I hope it's a long-term career. I love working with all these people with so much experience. It's not the same thing day in day out.

The worst thing?

It's starting to get hot. You go up to a machine with something wrong in the engine bay that's been running for six hours. Yep, that's bloody hot. Being the

apprentice, I often get the crap jobs. But that's ok, it's my time and everyone has to go through it, it's how you learn.

What's a funny story from work that you can tell?

I got covered in coolant one night changing a quick fill fitting. The fitter said he was crimping the hose, which I'm pretty sure he wasn't, as I got drenched in coolant. I was so soaked I had to have a shower mid shift. Some of the personalities can be pretty funny too. Two blokes on the crew stick close together and are lost without each other, we give them a bit of crap. But it's all in fun.

How different is your job to what you wanted to do when you were a kid?

I didn't have a big idea of what I wanted to do. I thought about going to uni and becoming a nurse, so this is a bit different.

What would your old man say about you when you were a kid?

I'm the youngest so it'd be

that I was a bit of a brat. A 'Witch with a B' mum used to call me. Dad was a bit shocked in the beginning, but he's gotten used to it. My brother is a fitter and he's a bit like dad and couldn't really believe it when I got the job. He still thinks he's the know it all and I love proving him wrong and saying I told you so... Ha-ha.

Family?

Two older brothers and an older sister. We're all pretty alike, the Goodwin gene runs strong in our family.

What do you do in the down time?

I bought a house by 21, which I'm proud of, so maintaining it. I was so happy when I was able to buy it. It's the best thing I've ever done. I've got a German Sheppard pup too, he's a bit of a turd and fulltime work. Going out with friends and because I've got a house, hanging out there. At Chrissy we're going down to Stockton for a fortnight on the beach in the caravan park, fingers crossed it doesn't rain.

And the perfect place to do just that is at the Sir Edgeworth David Memorial Museum which is bursting at the seams with stories, photos and memorabilia showcasing the rich history of the Hunter coalfields.

The museum is run by the Coalfields Heritage Group, led by Secretary Brian J Matthews and Assistant Secretary Lexie Matthews who were both in residence when I popped in. These guys are passionate about the Hunter's history and are delighted to share that passion with all who come through the doors.

The Group has 22 volunteer

SIMPLE AS THAT."

And a huge part of that history that they are tirelessly researching and preserving is to do with coal mining in the Hunter. With such a wealth of information available they are a source for many publications and videos about our industry.

"The researchers for the Last Stand at Nymbodia and the Lockout used our archives to help make those movies. We have documents here on 906 northern coal miles and many of those records don't exist anywhere else." Lexie tells me.

When asked how the museum came about Brian tells the story that back in 1996 a small group of locals got together to help preserve the Hunter's history. The Kurri Kurri High School gave permission for their then vacant and disused Sir Edgeworth David Memorial museum to become their headquarters and the Coalfield Heritage Group was formed. First on the agenda was to establish a local history archive. Today those archives are recognised as one of Australia's leading history centres with over 3.25 million pages of information.

They invite everyone from the community to come in and see what they are about. From teachers to researchers to the general public, all are welcome. "We love getting school groups involved in what we do, they ask the most surprising questions and look at things completely different which always makes it interesting." Lexie said.



FIRST AID SKILLS WERE PUT TO THE TEST AT THE ANNUAL COAL SERVICES FIRST AID COMPETITION HELD AT THE NEWCASTLE MINES RESCUE STATION IN NOVEMBER.

Ten teams from mine sites as far afield as Ulan and Tahmoor came together to compete. Mines rescue brigadesmen, emergency response and first aid officers participated in a series of complex, simulated scenarios ranging from burns and breaks, to amputation and snakebite. As well as live enactments, participants were also challenged through Coal Services' virtual reality training.

The scenarios are as close to real life as it gets and require teams to manage environmental and equipment hazards as well as multiple injuries and distressed casualties. Teams are assessed on how well they respond to the scenario and the level of proficiency with which they administer first aid. There is also a theory component.

General Manager Mines Rescue, Regulation and Compliance, Matthew Fellowes commented that the competition is undertaken in good spirit, but teams also know the importance of what they do and the value these competitions provide.

BEER

POTATOES


SUGAR

PORT STEPHENS

Inside the bay is fishing exceptionally well for flathead and whiting in the all the usual areas such as up the Karuah River, up around Lemon Tree, the Myall River and along Jimmies Beach. Blue swimmers and mud crabs are also on the move, so its well worth soaking a couple of pots while hunting a fish or two. Be sure to keep an eye on them as it seems the share farmers are also out to pick off any unattended crabbing gear. We are still hearing plenty of reports of Jew coming from the deeper holes around the Bay.

OFFSHORE

The marlin season is really starting to show its face with plenty of reports of fish being caught already. Plenty of blues and a few stripes have been encountered already along the shelf with some serious blues hooked and lost on the big gear. Let's hope this continues and we see a great bite over the festive season and as we move into the new year. The FAD's have also started to show plenty of signs of life with some really good fish holding on the Port Stephens Fad. It pays to get out

early to have a crack as the traffic on them is starting to build. We haven't been paying much attention to the inshore reefs lately, but I'm sure there would be trag, snapper, kingfish and the odd jew around as the bait starts to stack up around the reefs and the warm currents start to push in.

LAKE MAC/NEWY/STOCKTON

There's plenty of action in the lake with the numbers of good pan sized snapper and flathead being the stand out, taking plastics and soft vibes around areas holding bait. Reports of squid have been a little slow around the lake but can't be far away as the weather and water starts to warm up.

The prawns in the channel will be worth spot lighting around the dark just before Christmas as well. Newcastle Harbour and Stockton Beach have been the topic of some huge jewies with multiple big fish coming from the Breakwalls and the southern end of Stockton Beach. The flattie flickers are also enjoying a good bite around the harbour too.







This includes the land beneath the Godolphin and Coolmore horse studs and Golden Highway.

3. Better rehabilitation outcomes

Malabar will deliver a far more visually appealing final outcome at the existing Drayton Mine-site by using reject stone and rock from the underground mine at Spur Hill or an underground mine at EL 5460 to fill the legacy voids at the Drayton Mine.




