



THE HUNTER COAL FESTIVAL KICKS OFF ON APRIL 6 WITH FESTIVITIES RUNNING UNTIL APRIL 15.

This will be the third Hunter Coal Festival and represents a great opportunity for the local community to come together and celebrate all the good things mining brings to the Hunter. The NSW Minerals Council is proud to once again sponsor the Festival this year.

The themes of this year's festival are 'community, coexistence, innovation and education' highlighting what mining brings to the Hunter. Our miners, their families and local suppliers are all vital to our 'community'. Our industry has 'coexisted' with agriculture and other local industries in the region for around 200 years. 

NEWS THAT AGL WILL SPEND \$200 MILLION TO UPGRADE THE BAYSWATER POWER STATION IS WONDERFUL NEWS FOR THE HUNTER.

The upgrade will create 90 jobs over the four years that it will take to improve the station's capacity and efficiency.

This is excellent news all around. Not only will it provide jobs for the coal and related industries in the Hunter, but it will also provide enough energy for 100,000 homes – all without increasing emissions.

By replacing the original turbines with modern turbine technology, Bayswater will have an additional 100MW capacity. The four existing turbines will be replaced during planned unit maintenance outages and should be fully operational by 2022.

THE COMMITMENT FROM AGL TO UPGRADE BAYSWATER – THE SECOND LARGEST POWER STATION IN NSW – WILL PLAY AN IMPORTANT ROLE IN OUR ENERGY SECURITY.

The move is part of the company's New Generation Plan, which invests across a range of technologies – coal, gas, wind, solar and potentially battery and pumped hydro – to deliver ongoing energy security.



The company will replace the energy lost through Liddell through a range of strategies, including gas-fired power plants, renewable energy such as solar and wind, and a battery system to be installed at Liddell.





AUSTRALIAN PACIFIC COAL HAS LODGED AN APPLICATION TO MODIFY THE EXISTING MINING APPROVAL TO RECOMMENCE UNDERGROUND MINING OPERATIONS AT THE DARTBROOK COAL MINE.

The modification proposes bord and pillar mining of the Kayuga coal seam (as an alternative to the approved longwall mining activities) and changes to the method of transferring coal to the train loadout facility. The modification also seeks to extend the period of approval by 5 years until 5 December 2027.

AUSTRALIAN PACIFIC COAL SAYS THE REOPENED MINE WOULD EMPLOY 99 MINEWORKERS, WITH 26 JOBS CREATED DURING THE EARLY CONSTRUCTION PROCESS.

The modification will not increase the footprint of approved mining operations nor involve

restart of the existing coal washery.

The environmental assessment is expected to be submitted in May, with determination of the application anticipated in the September quarter and first production within six months thereafter which will see mining recommence in 2019.

POWER UP

MICHAEL JOHNSEN MP,
MEMBER FOR UPPER HUNTER
HAS CALLED FOR THE NSW

HYDRO TO BUILD A NEW

IN THE UPPER HUNTER.

"We need more base load power in NSW and the new generation high energy low emissions (HELE) technology coal fired power station is ready to build." Michael said.

"WE HAVE THE INFRASTRUCTURE, WE HAVE THE NEED, WE HAVE THE EXPERTISE AND NOW WE HAVE THE FUNDS."

In Mr Johnsen's opinion, investment into a new HELE coal fired power station makes sense. He says it will replace base load power from retired old generation power stations and ensure we have safe, secure and affordable energy for NSW for decades to come.

"When I'm talking with families and business, their main concern is rising energy costs. We can fix this by building a new



power station, increasing supply and lowering prices, so let's get on with it", Mr. Johnsen said.

THE PURCHASE OF THE NSW AND VICTORIAN SHARES OF THE SNOWY HYDRO IS EXPECTED TO NET OVER \$4BILLION FOR NSW. IT WOULD BE SENSIBLE TO UTILISE SOME OF THOSE FUNDS TO SECURE POWER AND A LOWER COST FOR CONSUMERS.

"The only thing stopping us from building a new HELE power station is the political will, that's not an excuse in itself. We have a responsibility to our citizens to provide low emissions, base load power at affordable prices, so let's get on with it", Mr. Johnsen said.



The conference will be held on April 12 at Wests New Lambton.



KEEPING **PUBLISHERS OPINION OAL COMMUNITIES STRONG**

THIS MONTH'S OPINION IS ABOUT COAL COMPANIES, **COMMUNITIES AND PEOPLE STAYING VISIBLE AND** REMEMBERING MINING'S ROLE AND CONTRIBUTION TO OUR LIVES IN THE HUNTER AND BEYOND.

About four years ago I convinced a rag tag bunch of passionate locals including Peter Eason that we needed a festival to celebrate our coal people, industry and our coal communities. At the time the downturn was starting to kick in and the anti coal activists and mainstream media seemed to be getting the upper hand in speeding up our demise. Jobs were being lost by the thousands and many businesses and people were hitting the wall as well.

The industry went in to fight and fight hard. After years of somewhat flying under the radar and operating in a sometimes

perceived veil of secrecy, an openness and new visibility that had started a bit before I came on the scene really kicked in. The Hunter Coal Festival was just one small part of that effort.

People spoke up. Coal companies, communities and people alike came out and fought for their future. I believe community engagement stepped up a notch and the openness achieved in other areas did a lot to improve our credibility.

At the time you could see it on the street and all and one made their voice heard. You could hear it in every home and business. The whole lot

Energy prices and security went out of control and finally the general public and the media started to realise the importance of coal. Anti-coal activism also finally received a well-deserved reality check. Globally, the coal industry rebounded and so too did local jobs and confidence.

Now things have improved, I think we have started to slip back into some old habits. Despite the Coal Festival, important initiatives like The Upper Hunter Mining Dialogue and the solid ongoing work of the NSW Minerals Council and Minerals Council of Australia, we are forgetting to keep up the fight and visibility at a local level and

it is showing.

The industry seems to be retracting back a bit into the days of keeping its head down. Getting on with the job is fair enough, but a quieting down of our social licence presence and promotion at a local level is not going unnoticed. Town offices, initiatives and other stuff seem to be thinning and people on the street are telling me just that. It could be a figment of people's imagination, but I don't totally disagree. Don't get me wrong; the industry is still doing great work out there.

And it is not just the mining companies. Our everyday people and workers have stopped talking it up just as much.

So, what's the point I hear you ask? If we don't passionately keep fighting,


MALABAR COAL LIMITED HAVE ANNOUNCED THAT ACQUISITION OF 100% OF THE **DRAYTON MINE ASSETS IS NOW** COMPLETED.

The Drayton mine assets provide the infrastructure that will be used in Malabar's Spur Hill Project and includes a coal preparation plant, coal stockpiling facilities, a rail loop, administration offices, workshops and other services.

The acquisition also includes Exploration Licence 5460 (EL) which contains the condition that restricts any potential development to underground mining only.


Malabar has commenced technical studies to prepare a development application which incorporates the existing Drayton mine infrastructure.

When we went to say hi it was immediately clear the boys were enjoying themselves and the place has welcomed them with open arms.



Former OCE Mick Rose was pretty happy with mining life and the life it helped him build, but like a few others out there, often wondered how all that experience and knowledge could be used to create a new opportunity. With years of experience operating every piece of equipment on mine and civil sites you could think of, buying some machines and setting up as a contractor would seem the choice. With so much competition out there though it was clearly a risky choice.

The latest trade data from the Australian Bureau of Statistics indicates the strength of coal exports in 2017 which were valued at \$56.5 billion, 35 per cent higher than 2016. This is the highest ever annual value of coal exports – the previous record was \$46.7 billion in 2011.

Coal was Australia's second largest export in 2017 behind iron ore, though historically coal has been Australia's biggest export earner.

In 2017 thermal coal exports were 200 million tonnes (Mt) worth \$20.8 billion while metallurgical coal

exports were 172 Mt with a value of \$35.7 billion.

Overwhelmingly the destination of coal exports continues to be Asia, spanning from established north Asian markets to the fast growing economies of Southeast Asia and India.

In addition to export, revenue coal continues to make a significant contribution the domestic economy including providing 75 per cent of generation in the National Electricity Market, over 51,000 direct jobs and \$5 billion in royalties annually.


Since the end of the downturn, mining companies have been nonstop announcing new jobs. But finding qualified and experience people to fill those jobs is becoming increasingly difficult. There is currently a strong demand for skilled tradespeople including fitters, operators, drillers and geologists.

Many who left the industry during the downturn have not returned but the biggest challenge that is being faced is encouraging young people to get into the mining industry. Just last month we reported on 1,000 apprenticeships that were waiting to be filled.

The Minerals Council of Australis has reported that mining engineering enrollments are rapidly declining and has projected them to continue to do so. With 171 enrolments in 2017, 98 in 2018, 69 in 2019 and 47 in 2020. This is despite the increased demand for mining, energy and resources employees. According to SEEK, job ads in mining, resources and energy grew by 54 per cent in the last 12 months.

Now more than ever we need to increase the understanding among younger people of the vital role mining plays in providing the essential elements of daily life and to encourage young people to begin an education in mining.

Well known for starting the powerful yet peaceful 'Shirts on the fence' 'You took my job you can have my shirt' protest on the corner of Edderton road during the Drayton South open cut campaign, Vodka is from up near Widden these days.

POST DRAYTON AND POST DOWNTURN, WE CAUGHT **UP WITH HIM AND HE HAS GONE FROM HUNTER COAL** TO HUNTING DOGS.

"Locally, and pretty much across most other rural communities, wild dogs are a big problem that is only getting bigger. Some of the damage, death and injuries to livestock can be heartbreaking. There are a lot of dogs out there despite baiting programs. Mine sites along with national parks and farming land are all prime locations for them to breed. While baiting is important and useful, these are cunning animals and the older dogs are known to teach the younger dogs to avoid them. In my time mining we always had dogs coming through. I had been in the mines operating dozers, graders and trucks since 1996. In underground and in open cut, the last time being at Drayton where I was retrenched along with the rest of the workforce. I've been trapping dogs now for about three and a half years and that's my job now. Just at Carabbe, I have caught 13 dogs in the last five weeks," said Vodka.

DESPITE THE INITIAL **DISTRESS AND UPHEAVAL** LOSING HIS IOB. VODKA **SAYS HE IS NOT REALLY** MISSING MINING.

Vodka passionately talked to us about how the drought is making things worse as more dogs have come out from higher country due to lack of water and feed in locations which is making the packs roam further and wider. Make no bones about it, killing dogs is a confronting business, but Vodka stressed there is a right and a wrong way to do it.

"Obviously we are killing feral animals but we are very careful to do it humanely. The traps we use are specially designed with rubber jaws and offset to hold the dogs while not being overly cruel. They are checked daily and putting them to sleep is done as efficiently as possible to minimize distress to the animal. The courses I have done teach best practice and I hope to grow the business combining my mining experience to be one of the best in the business," stated Vodka.

The mutt you can see in the picture is called Lucky..."Lucky to be alive!" laughed Vodka. She is 50% Dingo and Alsatian as far as we can ascertain. She went from target to part of the family."

THE HYPE ABOUT HYDROGEN

AS WE MOVE INTO A LOW EMISSIONS FUTURE, COAL COULD STILL PLAY A VERY IMPORTANT ROLE.

Coal is a complex and highly variable substance that can be converted into a variety of products, one of them being hydrogen. Hydrogen is produced by first reacting coal with oxygen and steam under high pressures and temperatures to form synthesis gas, a mixture consisting primarily of carbon monoxide and hydrogen.

The production of hydrogen from coal also offers environmental benefits when integrated with advanced technologies in coal gasification, power production, and carbon capture utilisation and storage.

AUSTRALIA HAS AN ABUNDANT, DOMESTIC RESOURCE IN COAL. THE USE OF COAL TO PRODUCE HYDROGEN FOR THE TRANSPORTATION SECTOR COULD REDUCE OUR ENERGY USE AND OUR RELIANCE ON IMPORTED PETROLEUM. WHEN HYDROGEN IS USED IN EFFICIENT FUEL CELL VEHICLES, EMISSIONS FROM THE TRANSPORTATION SECTOR CAN BE NEARLY ELIMINATED.

Right here in Australia we are already seeing plans to convert our Victorian brown coal into liquid hydrogen for export. The Victoria government is working with Kawasaki Heavy Industries on a proposed plant which will produce liquid hydrogen to export to Japan to be used in hydrogen powered vehicles. Maritime authorities from Australia and Japan have signed a world-first deal to ship the hydrogen.

This is one of just many coal based hydrogen projects underway and it will be interesting to see what's in store for the future.



PAT QUINN

A COAL MINER FOR HIS WHOLE WORKING LIFE, NOW LOCAL HISTORIAN, NOT TO MENTION CITIZEN OF THE YEAR NOMINEE, PAT QUINN IS PROOF THAT THE HARD WORK DOESN'T END WITH RETIREMENT.



Who are you and what do you do? I'm Pat Quinn and I'm a retired miner and proud member of the Singleton Historical Society and the local Probus Club.

Any nicknames good or bad? Quinny, Trev, PT. The rest I can't mention!

Where do you live and how long you been in the Valley? I came to Singleton in 1948 at the age of 10.

After I retired, my wife Ann and I travelled up and down the east coast to see what they had to offer, but in the

end, we decided they were good places to go for a holiday, but Singleton would always be our home.

When did you start? I started at Liddell State Coal mine as apprentice electrical fitter just a few days after my 16th birthday. Later it became Cummock Colliery and I was there for 18 years. In 1971 there was a fire at the mine and it was closed. I initially went to Liddell Colliery and then to Hebden Opencut. I stayed at Hebden for 9 years and then went on to Mt Thorley until I retired after 41 years in the industry.

What was it like working back then? Totally different from today. In 1953 it was a transition between contract mining and the mechanisation of the industry. Electricity was basic. The industry was recovering from the great coal strike of 49' so it was very political and unionised. The work was hands on, you walked down the pit and out of the pit. You would never see a fat coal miner back in those days because of the laborious work. And because your crib tin wasn't big enough for much more than a sandwich!

How big was a crew? A coal cutter crew would have three who cut the coal and drilled the face. Then there was a shotfirer and his assistant, plus a loader who put the coal on the shuttle car and then onto the conveyor belt. There was also two who were called second class shiftmen who did stuff like putting up brattice and moving fans. The team was extremely close, if you didn't work together, it wouldn't work. Our workforce was mainly locals, and we socialised together outside of work. My days underground are the ones I remember the most fondly and that I've kept the most mates from.

what's the best thing about your career? Mateship. The friends that I made, who will remain so for our whole lives. Also, all the opportunities I was given I'm so grateful for. Opportunities to further studies and to travel overseas and around Australia to keep up with the mining technology. Looking back, I was so glad to see

safety practices improve over the years. When I started not even boots were compulsory! No one knew first aid and there was no such thing as an induction. Such different days.


The worst thing? The strikes. Not long after my wife and I got married

there was a 3-month strike and we were desperate. From that I learnt and have taught my children that you always put something away for a rainy day. The pay wasn't great either, I used to get \$4.25 a week, our apprenticeship was five years and the study for TAFE you did at your own expense. But you knew it would pay off in the end.

What's a funny story from work that you can tell? So many stories! In those days everyone had a laugh with each other and it was all in good fun. I remember when the shotfirer was looking for a new assistant and they asked one chap. They told him the only downside is if you touch the explosives and then touch your forehead you are going to get a headache. And he said well that doesn't worry me, I've always got a headache. Yeah, he was known to enjoy a drop and always had a 'headache'. In those days you all caught the bus to work because no one had cars and he was just one of the many blokes who would get picked up from the Clubhouse Hotel and dropped back off there.

How different is your job to what you wanted to do when you were a kid? I wanted to be a teacher, but my parents said to get a trade. I knew the state mine was looking for an apprentice carpenter, but I wasn't keen on that so instead I found out who the engineer was and rode to his house on my bike. I hear you are looking for an apprentice engineer I said to him which he replied no we aren't. But then he said let me think about it and a couple of days later he shows up at my door and says your hired.

What do you do now? I've been retired for 24 years and have done a lot of travelling overseas and around Australia with my wife Ann. I also am a keen golfer. I did consultancy work for 5 years but then quit that when I had a heart attack. Now, I'm a member of the Singleton Historical Society and member of the local Probus club, which involves organising trips, guest speaking, researching and history tours. Being retired means I'm busy 8 days a week!

A COALTASTROPHE

AUSTRALIA ARE WORLD LEADERS IN MINING SAFETY, BUT WE'VE SUFFERED DISASTERS IN THE PAST. THE WORST WAS THE MT KEMBLA COAL MINING DISASTER IN 1902 WHICH CLAIMED 96 LIVES. IN COMPARISON, CHINA IS HOME TO THE WORST COAL MINING DISASTER IN HISTORY. THE BENXIHU COLLIERY DISASTER OF 1942 WHERE 1,549 MINERS DIED.

The tragedy occurred on 26 April 1942 in the Honkeiko coal mine, located near Benxi in the Liaoning province of China. The Japanese had invaded the area in the 1930s during the Sino-Japanese War and had taken over the mine. The Japanese forced Chinese labourers, some of whom had been captured from local military organisations, to work in the mine.

Conditions were deplorable, food was scarce, clothing nothing but tattered rags and shoes were so flimsy they wore out within a week. Diseases such as typhoid and cholera were rampant due to the terrible conditions and poor health of the workers. The Japanese overseers were harsh disciplinarians, often using violence to force miners to their shafts. The mine was surrounded by a guarded perimeter making

it more of a prison camp than a coal mine, and many described the work as slave labour.

ON THAT FATEFUL DAY
A GAS AND COAL DUST
EXPLOSION IN THE MINE
SENT FLAMES BURSTING
OUT OF THE MINE SHAFT
ENTRANCE. IN AN ATTEMPT
TO CURTAIL THE FIRE
UNDERGROUND, THE
JAPANESE SHUT OFF

THE VENTILATION AND SEALED THE PIT HEAD WITHOUT WAITING FOR AN EVACUATION. THIS REPORTEDLY LEFT WORKERS STILL ALIVE WITHIN THE SEALED-OFF AREA OF THE MINE TO EVENTUALLY SUFFOCATE IN THE SMOKE.

Miners' relatives rushed to the site after the explosion but were denied entry by a cordon of Japanese guards who erected electric fences to keep them out. Once the fire was out and the mine re-opened, it took 10 days to remove all the corpses and rubble from the shaft. The dead were buried in a mass grave nearby. Many victims could not be properly identified due to the extent of the burns.

Of those killed, 1,518 were Chinese, and 31 were Japanese. The Japanese at first reported the death toll to be just 34. Initial newspaper reports were minimal and downplayed the size of the disaster as a minor event. Eventually what really occurred began to leak out.

AFTERWARDS THE JAPANESE ERECTED

A MONUMENT TO THE DEAD WHICH GAVE THE NUMBER OF DEAD TO BE 1,327. THE TRUE NUMBER IS BELIEVED TO BE 1,549, 34% OF THE MINERS WORKING THAT DAY, MAKING IT THE WORST DISASTER IN THE HISTORY OF COAL MINING.

The mine continued to be operated by the Japanese until the end of World War II in 1945. After the Japanese withdrew, the workers took control of the site and allowed the Soviet Union to investigate the accident. Their report revealed that the majority of the fatalities were not caused by the initial explosion and fire, but instead were the result of secondary carbon monoxide poisoning and suffocation.



TARGETED TRAINING

NSW MINES RESCUE WILL BE THE FIRST TO DELIVER NEW 'FIT FOR PURPOSE' TRAINING FOR THE MINING INDUSTRY'S FRONTLINE TRAINERS AND ASSESSORS.

In the past there has been debate over the suitability of Training and Assessment qualifications and their 'fit for purpose' in the mining industry. In our industry, frontline trainers and assessors are tasked with delivering company or site-specific subjects or competencies in addition to their regular roles. They are not required to meet the Registered Training Organisation (RTO) industry criteria for delivering nationally recognised qualifications.

Mines Rescue have commenced the delivery of a new nationally accredited course called 'Course in Field-Based Training and Assessment – 10235NAT' targeted at those who deliver in-house non-accredited workplace training and assessment. The new course is comprised of one core unit focused on assessment, and one elective unit focused on training. This course, developed

The decision to move away from the full course was driven by the need for a more targeted solution, which we are now able to provide, thanks to Training Services Australia," Matt explained.



NEW TOOLS

THE NSW RESOURCES REGULATOR IS ROLLING OUT NEW TOOLS ACROSS THE STATE TO ENSURE THE HEALTH AND SAFETY OF MINE WORKERS.

Minister for Resources Don Harwin has announced that they will conduct workshops across NSW to help operators manage health risks in the workplace.

"Protecting our workers is a responsibility this Government takes extremely seriously," Mr Harwin said. "NSW has a comprehensive regulatory scheme in place to protect workers in the mining industry and we expect it to be followed at all times.

"A key requirement for mine operators is to develop health control plans and undertake health monitoring of their workers, and the NSW Resources Regular has developed a suite of new tools to help operators meet these requirements."

New tools and resources being made available for the industry include:

- educational videos on identifying and controlling health risks
- a health control plan guide
- tools that provide guidance on identifying, assessing and controlling health hazards
- resources that provide information about specific health hazards
- · fact sheets

In addition to these new tools, the regulator will host a series of workshops tailored to various mines, both large and small, to ensure their health control plans meet current legislative requirements.





Thanks to the Gully pub and it's hospitable locals for a great weekend.


Also, a special thanks to the empathetic and compassionate NSW Highway Patrol officers, west of the range. We love your work.

OFFSHORE

We are currently in the middle of one of the best Marlin seasons we've ever seen, so if it's on the bucket list now's the time to head out and have a crack whether its hunting the inshore reefs or out wide on the car park. The Bluefin Tuna of the northern variety have been sighted up off the bay and with everything else that's happening we should see an epic run of these speedsters as well.

Dolphin fish are also plaguing the local fads and fish trap floats scattered east of the bay in 90 meters of water. While we are on the subject if you have a couple of days up your sleeve its well worth heading north a couple of hours to Harrington or Port Macquarie as

the Mackerel have arrived in great numbers with some solid Cobia mixed in as well.

ESTUARY

In the Lake we are seeing good numbers of Arrow Squid taken around the drop over and Murrays Beach areas. School Jewfish are also being caught in good numbers on live squid and soft plastic lures worked around the bait schools. It's definitely still worth baiting up a trap for a crab as they are still in great numbers covering all local inshore waters.

BEACHES

With the Sun easing off the burn autumn is a great time of year to hit the beaches with just about everything on offer in good numbers especially Tailor, Bream,

TAKE A HIKE

WHEN IT COMES TO A GREAT DAY OUT WITH THE FAMILY YOU DON'T NEED A TON OF MONEY OR A HEAP OF EXPENSIVE EQUIPMENT. JUST A STURDY PAIR OF SHOES, AN OLD BACKPACK FILLED WITH WATER AND SNACKS, AND MOST IMPORTANTLY, A SENSE OF ADVENTURE.

If there's one thing the Hunter Valley has in abundance (apart from mines and wines) it's some bloody great walking trails. One of the most wellknown trails in NSW is The Great North Walk. This 250 km path starts in Newcastle and heads in to the Watagans before finishing at Sydney. Currently the record for hiking the Great North Walk stands at 54 hours and 52 minutes, but the best thing about this walk is it's easily broken down into manageable sections depending on how fit you are,



how experienced you are and what you are looking for in a walk.

For those of you who require beer stops along the way try the very beginning of the walk which starts at Queen's Wharf in Newcastle. This easy stroll offers great ocean views and plenty of coffee shops and bars to refuel at along the way. Stop at all the heritage sites along the way including Fort Scratchley, Newcastle Obelisk and my favourite Murdering Gully. It's claimed a Glenrock coal miner was leaning over a waterfall trying to catch water for his tea when he fell. When his body was found the head was missing and to this day his ghost wanders around still looking for its missing head.

FOR THOSE WHO TAKE THEIR HIKING MORE SERIOUSLY AND WANT TO HEAD INTO THE WILDERNESS, YOU ARE GOING TO WANT TO TRY SOME OF THE WATAGANS ATRAILS.

There's lots of different

access points including Millfield, Quorrobolong and Freemans Waterhole and walks graded from easy through to hard. What you can expect from most of these trails is abundant foliage and wildlife, beautiful rock caves, refreshingly clear and cool waterfalls and absolutely breathtaking lookouts. Unfortunately, you can also expect leeches, bloody steep hills and no mobile service in areas. So, play it safe and always make sure you have good maps, a compass and you tell someone where you are going and how long you are likely to be.

Whether you take a leisurely stroll along the beach, a strenuous hike through tough terrain or simply meander down to the local, there is nothing as refreshing for the mind and the body as walking out the front door and seeing where your feet take you. So, ditch the work boots for hiking boots and take a hike!

THERE IS NOTHING LIKE A ROAD TRIP TO BLOW OUT THE COBWEBS, AND A DRIVE FROM THE HUNTER TO MELBOURNE VIA THE NSW SOUTH COAST IS ONE OF THE BEST.

Road trips from our neck of the woods usually mean heading north. For lone rangers, couples and families alike, spending a 'take it as is comes' week cruising south down one of the most beautiful, relaxing and picturesque stretches of the Australian coastline won't disappoint.

A trip like this is more about forgetting than remembering, because within the first 24 hours your troubles, stresses and plans will all be forgotten. This is not a trip that should be planned very much at all in my opinion. Only vaguely deciding each day's destination and activities on the morning you wake up has the effect of slowing down time and making the trip a more delightful and surprising adventure. Taking it as it comes is the way to go.

But where will we stay I hear you ask? Anywhere you bloody well want my friends is the answer. From camping in out-of-the-way beachside van parks to staying in B and B's, basic motels and five-star luxury - mixing it up will make the trip memorable. I did a bit of everything and something different each night.

Definitely pack enough basic camping gear to increase your choices along the way even if you decide not to use it. Make sure you camp at least once like I did in the swag at the amazing little ocean front Tuross Beach Holiday Park.

THE GENERAL RULE I APPLIED WAS NO MORE THAN A FEW HOURS DRIVING A DAY.

From beautiful beaches and spectacular wilderness, to fun adventure and cracking food and wine, the South Coast is an unforgettable experience.

My first detour after leaving the Hunter was just south of Sydney through the Royal National Park on the Grand Pacific Drive towards appropriately named Coalcliff at the southern end. It's a spectacular spin through one of the world's oldest national parks and over the amazing Seacliff bridge. Taking the detours is the point here, that's where the special stuff is found.

Going south you can try Jamberoo Action Park and the zip-lines of the Illawarra Fly Treetop Adventures. Relax on some of the whitest sands in the world at Hyam's Beach, go diving, savour freshly shucked oysters and enjoy

a range of water sports, cycling and bushwalking.

Along the way pull in to the smaller towns for your pub, club, restaurant and take away feeds or at the flash end, are places like Rick Stein's at Bannisters in Mollymook. Batemans Bay is bigger but has plenty to offer and travelling through places like Narooma, Bermagui (great pub and feed here I can tell ya') and on to Tathra (where I crashed with friends for free), a beer in the pub on the headland is a must.


