



MAPPING TOOLS

THE NSW GOVERNMENT IS CONTINUING ITS WORK TOWARDS A MORE ROBUST AND TRANSPARENT PROCESS FOR ALL MINING AND EXPLORATION LICENCES.

This is reflected in the addition of an Environmental Mapping for Miners and Explorers tool to the SEED portal.

While this development will

improve transparency for the community it will also benefit industry.

The tool allows users to locate areas of environmental sensitivity so these areas can be avoided when planning exploration and mining projects.

The portal's built-in map lets users overlay several types of data to gain a

more complete picture of environmental conditions in a particular location.

THIS WILL HELP THE MINING INDUSTRY IDENTIFY AREAS OF SENSITIVITY BEFORE MAKING EXPLORATION APPLICATIONS.

If sensitive areas are avoided and impact restrictions followed, explorers will be able to apply for the Complying Exploration Activity (CEA) pathway. CEA has a 10-day assessment timeframe, compared to

30 days for non-complying exploration activity.

Currently the SEED portal has 120 sets of data from 12 NSW Government agencies. The Environmental Mapping for Minerals and Explorers tool will utilise 30 datasets, many of which have multiple spatial layers, from seven different agencies.

GET ON THE WAGON

32 NEWLY BUILT COAL WAGONS HAVE ARRIVED AT PORT OF NEWCASTLE FOR RAIL OPERATOR AURIZON.

Catherine Baxter, Aurizon's NSW General Manager said the 32 wagons in the consignment were only one part of a 284-wagon order, with each wagon having capacity to carry up to 97.8 tonnes of coal.

"These wagons will enter service for our newest customers, AGL Macquarie and MACH Energy, demonstrating the strong growth we have seen in our New South Wales Coal haulage operations since we started in 2005. Our coal haulage has increased from 180,000t in 2005 to 48Mt in 2017." Catherine said.

The arrival of the new Aurizon coal wagons is a clear indication of the continuing growth in coal exports and demonstrates the strong global demand for Hunter Valley coal.

Last financial year saw 162 million tonnes of coal exported through the Port of Newcastle and this strong demand is expected to continue.

THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT HAS UNVEILED A NEW TASKFORCE AIMED AT HELPING ENSURE THE LONGEVITY OF THE LOCAL MINING INDUSTRY, WITH FOCUS ON DEVELOPING MORE JOBS AND GLOBAL OPPORTUNITIES.

Resources Minister Matt Canavan said the Resources 2030 Taskforce would be charged with identifying reforms that would help secure the resources sector's future.

THE AUSTRALIAN GOVERNMENT WILL USE A REPORT FROM THE TASKFORCE TO DEVELOP A RESOURCES STATEMENT IN THE SECOND HALF OF 2018.

"This will be the first time since the late 1990s that the Australian Government has mapped out a policy statement for the sector," Canavan said. ""A successful resources policy will mean more jobs; more opportunities for Australian businesses to succeed on the global stage; and more flow-on benefits to other businesses and industries in regional Australia.

Canavan said the mining industry had never been as important to the

global economy as it was now. "The mining boom is not over. Mining is as important as it has ever been and its importance to the Australian economy is only likely to increase."

TRUST IS A **MUST**

A NEW NATIONAL SURVEY BY THE CSIRO ON ATTITUDES TOWARD MINING SHOWS THAT MOST AUSTRALIANS ACCEPT MINING AND HOLD POSITIVE VIEWS ABOUT ITS ROLE IN CONTRIBUTING TO THE NATION'S ECONOMY.

The CSIRO surveyed 8020
Australians. The top perceived
benefits of mining were job creation
and employment opportunities,
which outweighed the top perceived
negative impacts to the environment
and water quality. This balance
of benefits over negative impacts
is considered a strong driver of
Australians' general acceptance of
the mining industry.

HOWEVER, THE STUDY DID REVEAL THAT MANY AUSTRALIANS HOLD LOW LEVELS OF TRUST IN IN THE INDUSTRY, DON'T FEEL THEY HAVE A VOICE IN SHAPING THE INDUSTRY'S PRACTICES OR FAITH IN THE GOVERNANCE SURROUNDING MINING.

CSIRO social scientist Dr Kieren

Moffat said the results aim to give mining companies, government and communities a deeper understanding of the factors that lead to acceptance of the industry and the critical elements that develop trust between the community and industry.

"What remains consistent throughout all our social research is that trust is central to building strong relationships between industry and the communities they work alongside. The challenge is that trust is low across the board. Our work at the national and local scales in mining communities demonstrates that there are very tangible, practical ways that mining companies and industry can address this trust deficit."





THE ENVIRONMENTAL TEAM AT RIX'S CREEK MINE IS TAKING A BOW FOR A POSITIVE TREND IN NATIVE ANIMAL POPULATION DETECTIONS ACROSS BIODIVERSITY OFF-SET SITES PURCHASED FOR HABITAT AND NATIVE VEGETATION ENHANCEMENT.

As part of the Rix's Creek Mine Biodiversity Management Plan, more than 600 hectares across five sites mainly around Singleton have been isolated as off-set zones, to create protected sanctuaries where threatened species can thrive.

A unique aspect of the plan is the placement of 76 Nest Boxes that provide shelter and protection for Possums, Bats, Phascogales, Gliders and Birds.

Determining whether native animals are adapting in the areas comes down to twice-yearly fauna monitoring, which includes inspections of the Nest Boxes, remote infra-red camera monitoring and diurnal and nocturnal survey work.

THE MONITORING RESULTS FROM 2017 SHOW A HEALTHY PRESENCE OF MANY SUCH NATIVE ANIMALS ACROSS THE SITES, WITH THE BRUSH-TAILED PHASCOGALE TURNING OUT TO BE THE STARS - IF NOT THE EXTROVERTS - OF THE SHOW WITH MANY HAPPY AND HEALTHY PHASCOGALE

The news is particularly encouraging given that there was no evidence of the marsupials across the same areas from 2007 – 2014. Phascogales are known to have patchy distributions

across much of the east coast of New South Wales.

"There's a strong sense of satisfaction that goes with putting so much work into environmental offset plans and seeing vulnerable populations such as these come back," The Bloomfield Group Environmental Manager Chris Knight said.

"CAMERAS NEVER LIE AS THE SAYING GOES. WHAT THESE PICTURES TELL US IS THAT SO MUCH OF WHAT WE'RE DOING TO HELP NATIVE ANIMALS THRIVE IS WORKING. WELL MANAGED OFFSET AND BUFFER LANDS ARE BECOMING WILDLIFE REFUGES FOR THREATENED AND ENDANGERED SPECIES."

Comprehensive surveys for all fauna groups will be conducted again in 2018 and 2020, then every 3 years.



Backed by its mining industry partners, the Upper Hunter Mining Dialogue put the subject of rehabilitation of mined land on the educational program of April's Hunter Coal Festival.

The Dialogue expanded its community engagement display which visits local shows and events to include a strong focus on rehabilitation for the festival's Singleton Community Day on April 7.

THE DIALOGUE'S DISPLAY AND REPRESENTATIVES MANNING IT, EXPLAINED REHABILITATION AND HOW

IT IS AN INTEGRAL PART

OF THE MINING PROCESS FROM BEFORE LAND IS DISTURBED AT A MINE SITE TO PAST THE END OF A MINE'S LIFE AND AT ALL POINTS IN BETWEEN.

The Dialogue display was complemented by displays from mining industry partners including Glencore, Yancoal, Bengalla Mining Company, Mach Energy, Bloomfield Group/Rix's Creek Mine, BHP and Peabody Energy as well as a host of displays by industry supporters.

Many of the mining company displays also focused on rehabilitation with examples of their own "rehab success stories", rehabilitation experts on hand to explain the process and giveaways of native seedlings used locally to return mined land back to its natural form.

The estimated 6000-strong crowd attending the Singleton Community Day at the Singleton Showground allowed the Dialogue and the industry to discuss rehabilitation face to face with interested community members.

"Well, my mom and dad are Australian's, so I'm an Australian too."




The 10-day Hunter Coal Festival also gave the Dialogue other prime opportunities to engage with the Upper Hunter community; the Dialogue's Chairman Dave O'Brien presented an update on the Dialogue's activities to the more than 200 people attending the Mining Leaders Lunch on April 6 and about 40 community members attended an update on the Upper Hunter Synoptic Plan review on April 13.

The synoptic plan review is the result of a call for action at the Upper Hunter Mining Dialogue 2016 Annual Forum and Dialogue members are participating in the working group as part of the review.





POWER PLAY

THE CLOSURE OF THE LIDDELL COAL-FIRED POWER STATION IS STILL A CONTENTIOUS ISSUE WITH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT PRESSURING AGL TO EITHER KEEP THE PLANT GOING OR SELL TO SOMEBODY WHO WILL.

Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull says it is "manifestly in the public's interest" for the energy giant to keep the Liddell generator running beyond its planned 2022 closure and that AGL has a duty to shareholders to consider selling.

AGL has received an initial offer from Alinta Energy to acquire the Liddell Power Station for \$250 million. Alinta wants to keep running Liddell for five to seven years past AGL's current closure date of 2022.

There's also been calls from Coalition MP's for the government to forcibly acquire Liddell, however Energy Minister Josh Frydenberg has dismissed the idea insisting

the government will not start nationalising assets.

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission are also supporting the sale of the power station saying it would be a win for consumers and prevent any damage to the market when the it closes in 2022.

AGL remain not keen on selling, though they have stated they will consider all offers. They plan to replace Liddell's output with a mixture of gas, wind and solar power, and upgrades to the neighbouring Bayswater coal generator and will require Liddell's infrastructure for their future replacement plans.



TECH COMPANY IOT GROUP HAS SIGNED AN AGREEMENT WITH **HUNTER ENERGY TO UTILISE THE REDBANK POWER STATION TO** PROVIDE CHEAP POWER FOR CRYPTOCURRENCY MINERS.

The coal-fired facility has been unused since 2014, but Hunter Energy is proposing to recommission the station over the next 12 months if the landmark deal goes ahead.

IOT Group will develop two hectares of Redbank's 32ha site to establish Australia's first Blockchain Application Centre. Blockchain technology collects data into encrypted blocks and uses alot of computing power and energy. It's used by many different businesses but is best known for crypto mining companies such as Bitcoin.

Utilising Redbank's power, IOT Group which will supply blockchain operators with electricity at wholesale prices. With supply coming straight from the grid this will open the potential for crypto mining businesses where previously it has been too expensive.

Sean Neylon, the executive director of the IOT Group, is optimistic about the possibilities, stating, "IOT has created the biggest and only opportunity for global crypto miners to come to Australia. It offers the potential to create a new Silicon Valley in Australia."

GLENCORE'S NICOLE BROOK RECENTLY WON THE OUTSTANDING WOMAN IN NSW MINING AT THE 2018 NSW WOMEN IN MINING AWARDS. @ THE COALFACE SAT DOWN WITH NICOLE TO LEARN ABOUT HER JOURNEY IN THE COAL MINING INDUSTRY.

I met with Nicole at Glencore's Bulga site where she works in her role as General Manager of Business **Development and Technical Services** for the entire Glencore coal assets in Australia. Though she's busy managing 17 sites and leading a team of 50 personnel, Nicole agreed to share her story to show that gender is no barrier when it comes to having a successful career in the mining industry.

As we sat down in her office, I commented that the noisy haul trucks in the background must be annoying, but Nicole wouldn't have it any other way. "I love being here on site at Bulga rather than in a corporate office in Sydney. Being on site among the thick of it keeps me grounded and helps me focus on what really matters in the job. People."

Nicole grew up in Tasmania and leaving school she began studying general engineering, but when she was introduced to mining through her course she found her true passion. "I was given the opportunity to get out

I was immediately drawn to the problem-solving aspect of mining engineering. I decided to move to Sydney as mining engineering was not available in Tasmania."

WHEN NICOLE GRADUATED IN 1994 FROM THE UNIVERSITY OF NSW, WOMEN ENGINEERS WERE FEW AND FAR BETWEEN, ESPECIALLY IN THE COAL MINING INDUSTRY. NICOLE CONSIDERS HERSELF VERY FORTUNATE TO BE PICKED UP ON A GRADUATE PROGRAM WITH PORT KEMBLA COKE AND COAL.

"The first site I went to was Tahmoor where I went straight underground and worked on crew. While I was at Tahmoor, a couple of significant events occurred that really influenced how I looked at mining engineering. I realised it wasn't about just sitting in an office making up plans, but it had wide ranging implications on the safety of workers and the financial viability of the business. That's what really set me on path to where I am today. I no longer wanted to just understand the technical environment, but my interest was now sparked to learn about the business side of the industry."

Nicole worked in technical roles until an opportunity arose to work in business development. She took on new roles learning the ins and outs of both sides - technical and business, until her current role at Glencore was created especially for her combining both areas. Other

businesses normally have two people leading these areas separately, so it is a remarkable achievement that Nicole manages both.

ASKED ABOUT A TYPICAL DAY AT WORK, NICOLE SAYS THERE'S NO SUCH THING AS A NORMAL DAY. "EVERY DAY THERE IS A NEW PROBLEM TO SOLVE. BUT THAT VARIETY, THAT CHALLENGE, IS WHAT I LOVE MOST ABOUT THE JOB."

With only 3% of management roles in the coal mining industry held by women, Nicole's success is an amazing achievement and proof she is a deserving winner of the Outstanding Woman in NSW Mining award. Although she's not the type pf person who likes to be in the limelight, Nicole agreed to participate in the awards when she found out she was nominated.

"I believe that women in leadership roles in the industry have a responsibility to get out there and be role models and show that gender is no barrier when it comes to having a successful career in the mining industry. There are many male role models, but as you don't often see women in leadership roles, giving them recognition is very important. I also wanted to be a part of the awards to promote the work that technical professionals are doing in the industry."

NICOLE SAYS WE NEED EVENTS SUCH AS THE AWARDS TO SUPPORT WOMEN IN THE INDUSTRY BECAUSE

ALTHOUGH SHE HAS SEEN MANY IMPROVEMENTS FOR WOMEN SINCE SHE STARTED HER CAREER, THERE IS STILL A LONG WAY TO GO.

"Early in my career there was no infrastructure to support women, no bathhouses, no underground toilets, and even clothing and safety wear were male orientated. Those types of things set you apart from the beginning and can make it hard to fit in. In any workplace, connections and networking come through common

interest. When you work in an industry where females only make up 12%, then it can be difficult to make those connections. That's why it's so important to support women in our industry and the awards is a great example of that."

The awards are only one of the ways Nicole is promoting women in the industry.

She has been involved in mentoring for the Women in Mining Network (WIMnet) program and has recently taken on the role of chair for the Hunter region branch for The Australasian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy (AusIMM).

When it comes to the future of the mining industry, Nicole says there has never been a better time than now for women. "More and more companies are realising that a diversified workforce has many benefits, especially in

innovation. With the current low participation rate for women in the coal mining industry and companies actively trying to increase it, this means for women the opportunities are quite significant. I hope that by being involved in the awards and sharing my story, it will encourage women to consider a career in the industry."

facilities and is an initiative of the Racing NSW Equine Welfare Fund. Member for Bathurst Paul Toole said. "It's a win for regional NSW and particularly the Central West, creating hundreds of jobs, both directly and indirectly."

COEXISTENCE LOCALLY. THERE COULD BE MUCH MORE ON OFFER THAN THE HORSE CARE, AND IT **COULD EASILY BECOME A** TOURIST ATTRACTION.

Taking a few points from a government study we understand that the Australian racing industry is the second largest in the world with more than 32,000 racehorses. Horses generally have their first start as 3 year olds or older with only a few racing into double digit years. For most horses with potential life span of 25 years, these horses need to go somewhere.

So, what happens to all those racehorses? Every season, approximately 11,000 racehorses retire. Records tell us that approximately

3,000 of the 11,000 retirees go to stud, staying in the racing industry leaving 8.000 horses.

The vast majority of racehorses go on to new careers in a large range of areas, including breeding, leisure horses, sport horses, stock horses and police horses. Very, very few end up at the knackery despite the mistruths promoted by some. Like mining, the racing industry operates under a social license and must adhere to community standards.

So maybe it's time to look at the feasibility of a plan like this. The Hunter mining industry is perfectly positioned to create a productive facility. The expertise is there and perhaps the need. Giddy up!

Wazz generally a bit of Cookie, and probably some worse things from the wife at times.

Where do you live and how long you been in the Valley?

I live in Singleton. I moved to the area in 2010 from Mackay due to a promotion with Orica, and soon jumped to Anglo at Drayton Coal Mine. I met my wife here at the start of 2011 and we have 3 kids that love the area.

When and why did you decide to become a miner?

I first got into explosives and loved it. I started off moving from mine site to mine site. I suppose it gave me a good work life balance and helped me achieve financial goals in life.

What's a usual day at work entail?

I start the day off with briefing the crew on their objectives for the day, whether that's prepping a shot, loading a shot or firing a shot. Then managing the safety of the crew. After work its generally looking after the kids, getting to the gym and a little time relaxing with the Mrs. I don't mind playing a bit of touch footy as well.

How big is the crew?

At present I have 10 on the shot crew and 5 to 6 drillers. Roughly overall, I think we have about 2 rotating crews of about 15, plus a day crew of about 10.

What's the best thing about your job?

Kicking off a new mine site means a lot of implementing rules and policies to achieve safe production, and to help everyone enjoy their job. It's just fantastic to be a part of a progressive new age pit. The worst thing

I suppose that since the Industry has taken off again, the hardest thing is getting people, and the right people at that. The company is very motivated about having the right people that live and work locally.

What's a funny story from work

In a past life...gee I had better not, we'll save them for pub talk hey.

Camping is definitely up there, and going to remote places in this beautiful country. There is so much to see and do, and I wouldn't mind ticking a lot off my bucket list while I'm relatively young. Restoring cars would be another hobby, and getting out on my bike and going for a cruise, though most importantly family comes first.

How different is your job to wha you wanted to do when you were

Every young Australian boy would love to do what I do and blow things up. If I could pick another job, I'd be hard pressed finding something that I love as much as this job and place to work.

What would your parents say about you when you were a kid?

That if there was ever any trouble in town, my parents definitely thought for some reason I was involved haha.

Yeah the wife, I'd be lost without her. I have 3 kids including a stepdaughter who is 13 and changed my life for the better when she came into it. She's a good kid - very smart but as she's in high school I'm looking into getting my gun license (haha), but to those boys just remember what my job is. Our kids are adorable and all 3 mean the world to me.

What do you do in the down time?

WE REMEMBER

MORE THAN 1800 HUNTER VALLEY COAL MINERS ENLISTED IN THE AUSTRALIAN INFANTRY BATTALION DURING WORLD WAR ONE. HERE IS THE STORY OF THE ULTIMATE SACRIFICE MADE BY ONE OF THEM.

James Bruce was born in Scotland on November 5, 1879. As a young child he immigrated to Australia. When World War 1 broke out he was 38 years old and living with his family in Pelaw Main and working in a nearby coal mine. After enlisting in a recruiting march at Kurri Kurri on January 3, 1916, he was drafted into the 34th Infantry Battalion and a few months later set sail for France.

James saw much action in the war, leading countless ruthless and demoralising raids into the opposing German trenches in search of prisoners for interrogation and intelligence gathering. Because of his acts, the Germans bestowed the nickname of 'The Ginger Haired Devil' upon him and it is also thought that a bounty had been offered by the Huns for either his capture or death.

The first of these medals was awarded during the second battle of Passchendaele on 12th October 1917. When all the officers in his battalion were killed, James organised the remaining men and gave order to dig a new defence line which was held until the battalion was ordered to withdraw that afternoon. For his gallantry, bravery and leadership under extreme adversity in

Passchendaele, he was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal.

At the first battle of
Villers-Bretonneux early in
April 1918, for further gallantry
and leadership while facing
overwhelming numbers of the
enemy, James was awarded
the Military Cross. His citation
reads "Throughout the operation
Lieutenant Bruce set a magnificent
example of courage and coolness
to his men, and his services were
eminently valuable."

James was wounded in action on May 8, 1918 receiving a gunshot wound to the shoulder and evacuated to 8th General Hospital in Rouen. He was in hospital for less than three weeks before re-joining his company. A little more than 2 months later he was killed in action at Villers-Bretonneux, France on July 17, 1918.

James was killed by a German artillery shell exploding in the trenches while on his way to breakfast. He was thirty-nine years old, although on his headstone his age is stated to be forty. With his death his wife, Louisa, lost her husband and his children lost their father

Lieutenant James Bruce, MC, DCM is buried in the Villers-Bretonneux Military Cemetery at Fouilloy in France. His epitaph reads: 'He Gave His Life for His Country'.



A NEW STUDY FROM CSIRO'S DATA61
IN PARTNERSHIP WITH SAFE WORK AUSTRALIA HAS IDENTIFIED SIX 'MEGATRENDS' SET TO RE-SHAPE WORKPLACE HEALTH AND SAFETY.

New technologies and ways of working will introduce new challenges for work health and safety (WHS) and workers' compensation, but also have the potential to make work safer and reduce workplace injury over the next 20 years.

The Workplace Safety
Futures report explores how six
mega trends underpinned by
advances in digital technologies
and shifting employment patterns
may affect WHS and workers'
compensation in Australia in years
to come

The six megatrends shaping the future workforce environment for Australia include:

The extending reach of automated systems and robotics.

The costs of advanced automated technologies are likely to continue falling and the capabilities and widespread deployment are likely to continue rising. Physical workplace injury is predicted to fall by 11 percent by 2030 as the use of robotics including AI and drones replaces dull, dirty and dangerous tasks.

Rising workplace stress and mental health issues.

Australia's workforce is registering increasing levels of stress and mental health issues. New and intensifying uses of digital technologies in the workplace may exacerbate problems with mental health and stress, but technology also presents opportunities to manage these issues.

Rising screen time, sedentary behaviour and chronic illness.

The amount of daily screen time has grown for both adults and children and there is a continued drift away from manual jobs towards sedentary jobs. Rates of obesity, cardiovascular disease, type 2 diabetes, and other chronic illnesses continue to rise.

Blurring the boundaries between work and home.

An increasingly large share of Australian workers are entering into work arrangements that enable them to work from home or other locations, blurring the boundaries between work and home life.

The gig and entrepreneurial economy.

The gig economy refers to freelance task-based work organised through online platforms or 'apps'. It changes the way we work away from traditional employment models. Although the Australian gig economy is still relatively small, at least some growth is anticipated.

An ageing workforce.

The average age of Australia's workforce is increasing along with the ageing of the population as a whole and older Australians are having to stay in the workforce longer.

Safe Work Australia is already looking at ways the findings can inform future policy development and draw attention to areas where new guidance, research and data might be needed.

Influenza is a respiratory illness commonly known as 'the flu'. Typical flu symptoms include fever, cough, muscle aches and pains, nasal congestion, headache, sore throat and fatigue. Plus, there's also the especially nasty strain of 'man flu' that affects half the population.

According to NSW Health statistics, approximately 20 per cent of the population are affected by the flu each year. The virus is airborne and mainly spread by droplets made when an infected person coughs or sneezes and can remain active when airborne for more than 45 minutes. People can be infectious before they even have symptoms which makes it even more likely for you to catch it unknowingly.

While most people recover from the flu in about a week, it can lead to more serious health

problems like bronchitis or pneumonia. Complications from the flu can be deadly with an estimated 3,500 deaths in Australia each year.

Influenza is caused by a virus, which is a tiny infectious germ that hosts itself on another living organism's cells.
Different strains dominate each year. Each year a new flu vaccine is created based on the all the latest evidence and information to decide which strains of flu are likely to appear in the next flu season. Vaccines are created to protect against these strains, usually containing three or four strain vaccines.

VACCINES ARE NOT FOOL PROOF, HOWEVER IN HEALTHY ADULTS THEY ARE 60 TO 70 PER CENT EFFECTIVE.

But the flu vaccine is not just about protecting yourself it's

also about protecting other people, including those who are too sick or too young to be vaccinated, as well as vulnerable groups such as babies, people over 65 years and pregnant women. The more people who are vaccinated in the community, the less likely the flu will spread.

This year's governmentfunded flu vaccine is already available. It's free for people in at risk categories which include pregnant women, people aged 65 or older, people with medical conditions such as asthma or diabetes and here in NSW flu jabs are free to children between six months and five years old.

SO WHY ISN'T EVERYONE JUMPING AT THE CHANCE FOR A JAB?

Unfortunately there is a lot of misinformation about the flu vaccine, the main myth being that the vaccine gives you the flu. Which is impossible as the vaccine contains a

tiny amount of deactivated, unharmful virus, it does not contain any of the live virus that causes influenza.

The rumour may have started because some people experience minor flu-like symptoms after receiving the vaccine which is due to the vaccines' interaction with your immune system. These tend to be rare and mild, only lasting for one or two days.

Graeme will this year split his time between Canada and Europe between the Crankworx and World Cup Events. "I base myself out of Quebec in Canada. Quebec is such an amazing place. It's not a cheap exercise either. His first full race season in 2015 was self funded and cost approximately \$50k. Last year he was lucky enough to be in a factory team, and this year he has teamed up with local bike

industry supplier Lusty Industries onboard Santa Cruz bikes. "The guys at Lusty Industries are nothing short of amazing. It's a really professional and friendly environment and I'm so glad to be part of the team. With their support, and the fact I've done more preparation at home, I think I will give this World Series a fair shot."

Graeme attributes much of his success and the ability to follow his own path to his dad. "My old boy has been in the mining industry all his life, and it was the sacrifices he made when I was a kid that gave me opportunity to develop my skill and be living this life. It's a tribute to him and the man he is."

Graeme is very excited about heading off to compete this year, but he says it wouldn't be possible without all the support he's received. "To be able to achieve my goals knowing I have the support of people back home is a dream come true. I have to thank my employer Walton Mining Services for their ongoing support. They are a fantastic company to work for. I also can't thank Lusty Industries enough for giving me a shot. I'm going be giving it my all to make them proud."

It looks like it's going to be a big year ahead for Graeme and all of us in the Hunter will be wishing him luck.

THIS MONTH WE GOT A HIGHFLYING OPPORTUNITY TO SEE WHAT IT TAKES TO GET A LICENSE TO FLY A CHOPPER.

If you have ever been up in a helicopter I'm pretty sure you will agree it's a bit of a thrill. Getting a license to fly one is a whole other kettle of fish. But as we learnt this month, it's not as much of a pie in the sky dream as you would think. Hunter Valley Helicopters was established 10 years ago doing scenic flights, lunch

tours and it's grown from there. With that success they've decided to branch off and start a chopper flight school at Cessnock, conveniently based right here where we live and work.

So, one nice sunny afternoon I buckled up and wound up a Robinson R44 with flight training instructor Oliver McClelland. This job really is a blast some days.

As the chopper left the ground it was impossible to not grin as we hovered along the runway before swooping off over the beautiful vineyards of Pokolbin.

Oliver said, "Of course there's a lot to take in at the beginning and there's new skills to develop, but as you progress through your training the well structured syllabus helps make sense of it all. It's all about common sense. You're using your hands and your feet at the same time, but again, that's no different when you are driving a car. The necessary skills develop quickly over time."

Oliver told us they've already got quite few local miners going through the paces and they all love it. "It's something they can share with mates and family. One or two are doing their private license and the rest are doing the full commercial version. Some are potentially looking at a career change down the track," said Oliver.

Oliver reckons the good thing about a helicopter career is that it's often in tourism industry to begin with, so it's weekend work if you want to keep your day job and just fly for a bit of fun on the weekends.

SO, IF YOU WANT TO BECOME A HELICOPTER PILOT, HOW LONG IS IT GOING TO TAKE, HOW HARD IS IT AND HOW MUCH IS IT GOING TO COST? While it's not cheap it's also not so prohibitive that a regular miner couldn't afford it. A lot of people just fly once per week on the weekend, which will takes one and a half to two years. Others just want to smash it in six months.

A commercial license is around \$52,000. Private is around half that.

"THE TRUTH IS IT'S NO MORE EXPENSIVE THAT SOMEONE WHO'S RIGHT INTO HORSES OR CARS. THE WHOLE IDEA IS THAT WE CAN TAKE ANYONE FROM ANY BACKGROUND AND TRAIN THEM TO FLY A HELICOPTER," SAID OLIVER.

50 hours gets you a private license and a commercial license generally takes 105 hours. On a private license you can go anywhere. Touring would obviously be a lot of fun and a bit different to the average weekend drive. Guys also love it for fishing in remote areas. You can go anywhere in a helicopter, you can even land in your backvard if it's big enough. Want to impress that new love interest? Pick her up in a chopper.

I love food. Whether it's fish and chips served in newspaper, a schnitty from the pub, or a fancy a la carte dinner, I love food in all it's variations. But there's definitely a special place in my stomach for the king of all meals. The degustation menu.

Okay, so maybe it's more to do with my greedy appetite and the fact that plate after plate of food just keeps arriving at the table. The anticipation of wondering what's next,

even while still eating the course before.

I first learnt about degustation restaurant EXP from a friend who couldn't stop posting photos to their Facebook page. A barrage of images of amazing dishes that looked more like works of arts then plates of food. As new images popped up every 10 minutes with accompanying comments raving about their delectableness I knew this was a job for @ The Coalface. My mission was the food as good as it looked or was this a case of Facebook photoshopping. When we arrive at EXP,

I'm immediately struck but just how intimate it is. Which is really just another word for small. But it's a nice atmosphere, and surprisingly unpretentious. In my eagerness we are the first people there, but it's not long before every table is taken. 
