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


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Headed by the Resources Regulator, the State's mining watch dog, a thorough state-wide safety sweep of over 100 mines, quarries, and petroleum sites and facilities right across NSW was conducted this past May in the largest operational deployment of personnel and resources since the Regulator's establishment in 2016.

The State plays an important

included micrometres, calipers and gauges. These practices are time consuming and require considerable checks and balances to ensure quality data is captured.

The unit can be used to measure critical features on a component and easily determine relative positioning between features which would otherwise be difficult and inaccurate with traditional measuring devices.

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SCRUBBED

The closure of Wallaby Scrub Road is set to go ahead with Singleton Council receiving approval in principle from the Department of Industry.

The approval relates to the closure of 5.99km of Wallaby Scrub Road from the intersection of Putty Road but excludes a portion of Crown road adjoining the road corridor. The closure is also conditional that the land is sold to adjoining landholders Warkworth Mining Limited and Miller Pohang Coal Company Pty Limited.

BACK TO WORK

Production will recommence at Austar after the NSW Resources Regulator lifted all prohibition notices following the coal burst incidents to allow limited longwall activities under controlled conditions.

Yancoal have recalled all employees who were stood down or redeployed to other Yancoal-owned underground operations to recommence production.

APPRENTICESHIPS ABOUND

The NSW Government is offering 100,000 free apprenticeships to ensure there is a strong pipeline of skilled workers across the state. The new \$285 million skills and training package means that as of July, free apprenticeships will be offered to newly enrolled apprentices in any course.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Skills John Barilaro said NSW needs more apprentices to ensure we have a strong pipeline of skilled workers for the NSW job market. "We know that without skilled workers, our economy will stall. This sort of free training offer has never been made before, so I encourage people thinking about skilling up, or starting a new career to make the most of it." Mr Barilaro said.

The 100,000 free apprenticeships will be on offer over the next four years and include all 121 courses currently funded under the Smart and Skilled program.

A BLOW FOR HVO

More than 100 workers at Hunter Valley Operations are preparing to lose their jobs, according to the CFMEU. The union was called to meetings with managers at HVO which is jointowned by Yancoal and Glencore.

"They formally advised us they were going to make 116 jobs redundant," CFMEU Northern District president Peter Jordan told ABC radio.

A Glencore spokesman says HVO has begun consultation with employees and the CFMEU over the proposed restructure at the open cut mine and that all discussions on the restructure would be open and transparent, involving workers from all areas of HVO.

LOOKING FOR LEGENDS

Nominations are being sought for latest batch of outstanding Singleton citizens to join the Wambo Coal Singleton Hall of Fame.

Peabody Energy has partnered with Singleton Council to recognise individuals, families or local organisations who have achieved significant prominence at a state, national or international level in their field of endeavour since the Hall of Fame's inception.

Nominations close on 7 September 2018, with this year's inductees to be announced at a gala event on 14 November 2018.

DROUGHT DOUGH

With 99 per cent of the State now in drought the NSW Government has announced further support with a \$500 million Emergency Drought Relief Package, taking the total drought support to more than \$1 billion.

Premier Gladys Berejiklian said farmers are facing one of the driest winters on record, resulting in failing crops, drastic water shortages and a diminishing supply of fodder to sustain livestock.

A TON OF TRUCKS

Caterpillar has manufactured and delivered its 50,000th articulated truck since the first Catbranded articulated truck was manufactured in Peterlee, United Kingdom in 1985.

It is the third truck milestone for Caterpillar this year, following the 5000th 793 mining truck and the 1000th 797 mining truck.

BOOM TIME

The production phase of Australia's mining boom is continuing to create prosperity and jobs through massive export growth, with new records for coal exports released by the Australian Bureau of Statistics.

Australia's exports of goods and services surpassed \$400 billion for the first time in 2017-18, due mainly to growth in resources exports which accounted for 55 per cent of total exports.

Coal exports were only just behind iron ore, reaching a new record high of \$60.1 billion in 2017-18 – up 11 per cent or \$5.9 billion from the previous year.

MORE HOPE

New Hope Corporation has made a binding commitment with Wesfarmers to double its interest in the Bengalla Joint Venture (JV) for \$860 million.

New Hope currently holds a 40 per cent interest in the Bengalla coal mine and the deal with Wesfarmers will allow them to acquire up to a further 40 per cent for a possible 80 per cent in total.

RALLY FOR RIGHTS

A recent rally at Muswellbrook led by the CFMEU called out on Hitachi to start treating their tradesman as 'coalminers.'

The CFMEU's Northern Mining and NSW Energy District President Peter Jordan said more than 50 tradesmen across the district were seeking to secure enterprise agreement conditions in line with the miners they toil alongside.

"Although they work in coal mines every day, Hitachi is refusing to recognise them as mineworkers. The issues mainly centre on those workers not being treated truly, in every respect, as coalminers," Peter said.

Industrial action including rolling stoppages will continue until Hitachi offers a better deal.

Quantifying NO2 concentration in blast fumes using drone technology -**Glencore Ravensworth**


The current method of monitoring dust levels is complicated by the difficulty in gathering sample data to assess the accuracy of the standard industry guidelines. Ravensworth addressed this issue by combining drone technology and gas sensors to gather accurate and quantifiable Nitrogen Dioxide concentration data from blast plumes. Results of the project have shown a correlation between the fume colour/intensity and Nitrogen Dioxide concentration which both supports and allows for future calibration of the standard industry guidelines.

Address the criteria. Break it down and reflect it on your previous work (paid or unpaid) or life experiences and give examples. If you don't you may not get a second look in. In fact, the person who addresses the criteria will often get a look in over the "who you know" in

it like your first date. Don't ramble on with words to fill the space, instead go for quality responses with reference to past work experiences that will justify your answer. Remember, you don't have to flow it in one full letter. Complete an opening about what sets you apart and then separate each criterion and answer it.

Most people won't have it that their resume needs to be fixed. Previous jobs and a few referees don't cut it in this day and age. If you want to get that job, you need a smooth flowing informative resume at first glance. Not a resume that looks like a note to your child's teacher, or a novel

listing everything including the time you were asked to clean a bathroom. Grab their attention quick and smart!







contractors working alongside each other and each playing a part in the making the mine a success. Operations Manager, Charlie Spence says one of the biggest strengths of Bulga has been the underlying workplace culture and the pride and dedication of the workforce.

"South Bulga started on a shoestring and right from

the get go there was a strong sense of ownership among the workforce. You felt like you were part of something bigger than yourself. We were breaking records and having a good time doing it. The underlying workplace culture always made you feel empowered and it made it a great place to work." Charlie said.

It's certainly been an



employer of choice in the industry and many who have worked at Bulga have gone on to make a mark in the industry.

SETTING RECORDS

Bulga broke many records when it came to productivity at all three of its mining operations.

In 2005, Beltana broke the Australian longwall production record, with an output of 955,049 tonnes. This achievement was quickly trumped when one million tonnes of coal, from longwall and development, was mined in a single month. Beltana

was the first coalmine outside China to achieve this level of production, and the mine received international recognition as one of the best underground operations/workforces in the world.

Keeping up the same incredible levels of production was Blakefield South. In 2014 a record breaking 1 million tonnes of coal was produced for three consecutive months, a substantial achievement for an underground mine and a milestone in Australian mining.

When the decision

was made to close the underground operations, the workforce at Bulga saw it as an opportunity to go out strong. For the last year of operation, they smashed out their budget and production goals. Although the forecast was for 4.1 million tonnes, they did a whopping 6.2 million. This goes to show the committed attitude of the entire workforce right to the very end.

COMMUNITY COMMITTED

Bulga has always strived to be not just accepted by the local community but welcomed. Whether it was working with the vineyards it operated under or working with dairy farmers whose property they drilled gas through, it was always about working together for mutual benefit.

What is unique about Bulga is that their activities took place beside and below the thriving Broke Fordwich wine tourism area, the only mine to ever mine underneath commercial vineyards. It involved 2 years of extensive planning, consultation and trials and was a success.

They've mined under Charlton Road 16 times, Broke Road 3 times and privately-owned vineyards, farms and properties with

little impact. They've even mined under the irrigation & town water supply pipelines and powerlines, without any interruption to supply. Throughout the life of the mine they supported

countless local events, ran community BBQ's, working bees and family days, and directly funded many local organisations, most significantly, Broke Public School.

SOUTH BULGA COLLIERY 1991-2003

The first underground mine in Australia operating a single longwall to produce more than four million tonnes of coal per year. In 1996 the mine achieved labour productivity exceeding 24,000 run of mine tonnes per employee. This was double that of the next most productive underground mine, and well ahead of most open cut mines.

BELTANA HIGHWALL MINE 2000-2011

In September 2004 Beltana Highwall Mine achieved the highest production per employee of any coalmine in NSW, either underground or open cut. By the end of 2004 Beltana had produced a record breaking 6 million tonnes of coal. As production

rates soared, development crews were also achieving outstanding results, with mining advancing at rates of over 4 metres per hour. Performance levels achieved in 2004 earned Beltana the title: "The Coal Factory".

BLAKEFIELD SOUTH MINE 2009-2018

Blakefield South was internationally recognised as a leader in the application of Extended Reach Drilling (ERD) to meet the requirements of gas drainage in a coal mine. The project, commenced in 2009, required close partnership between Bulga Coal Management and PathFinder, a subsidiary of Schlumberger, and a number of innovations to adapt oil industry techniques to the context of Blakefield South.









Many of you will know someone who, through injury, age or disease is unable to manage their financial affairs or health needs. Or as you approach retirement your financial advisor may ask you the question; "have you a Power of Attorney and Enduring Guardianship in place?" You probably said to yourself, "what are they and do I need them?"

A POWER OF ATTORNEY



ALLOWS YOU TO APPOINT A PERSON OR PERSONS TO **MANAGE YOUR FINANCIAL AFFAIRS ON YOUR BEHALF. A ENDURING GUARDIANSHIP ALLOWS** YOU TO APPOINT A PERSON OR PERSONS TO MANAGE YOUR LIFESTYLE MEDICAL AND GENERAL HEALTH WHEN YOU ARE UNABLE TO DO SO YOURSELF. WHETHER YOU NEED ONE IS A PERSONAL DECISION BUT REMEMBER THIS, ONCE YOU LOSE YOUR MENTAL **CAPACITY IT'S TOO LATE.**

You may execute a Power of Attorney for practical or business reasons, like appointing a person (known as your attorney) for a specific task or period. For example, you are going on an overseas holiday and you need documents to be signed while you are away. Alternatively, you may execute an Enduring Power of Attorney to allow your attorney to manage your financial affairs

even after you lose your mental capacity.

An Enduring Guardianship will allow your attorney to make health, medical and lifestyle decisions for you if you lose the mental capacity to do so yourself. This might include decisions about what medical treatment you will receive, whether you will placed in a nursing home or even whether attempts are to be made to revive you in the event that are unable to sustain your own life without artificial assistance.

If you have strong views about this last aspect, that is, what emergency treatment you are to receive or not to receive, then you can make an Advanced Care Directive as part of your Enduring Guardianship or as a separate document.

AT IS AN ARBORETUM I HEAR YOU SAY? AN ARBORETUM A BOTANICAL GARDEN DEVOTED TO GROWING TREES A CONSERVATION, SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH AND

Pronounced "arr-boor-eetum" The term arboretum was first published by John Claudius Loudon in 1833 in The Gardener's Magazine. Arboreta specialise in growing particular types of trees. We actually have one already in Canberra. But with this kind of thing, another one would be a welcome addition that could support the national one.

The National Arboretum Canberra features 94 forests of rare, endangered and symbolic trees from around Australia and the world. Many of the trees are still young but two of the forests are over 100 hundred years old. Over 44,000 trees from over 100 countries are growing across the huge 250-hectare (618 acre) site, making it one of the world's largest living collections of rare, endangered and significant trees.

At the Canberra example the Village Centre is the first point of arrival for many visitors at the Arboretum, offering an elegant and memorable welcome. This award-winning, architect-designed building with panoramic views over Canberra provides a variety of high-quality visitor services and facilities, including a restaurant, cafe, gift shop, information hub, and the National Bonsai and Penjing Collection.

The unique nature-themed Pod Playground abuts the northern side of the Village Centre, and the Canberra Discovery Garden is located on the southern side. In time, the Arboretum will be home to 104 forests of rare, endangered and symbolic trees from Australia and around the world.

Here in the Hunter we are already home to many endangered and heritage species and the opportunity to showcase them all together offers so much value in terms of science and tourism. It could take mine site rehab to a whole new level and the benefits to the community would be considerable. Bring it on we say.

BEACONSFIELD MINE

The Beaconsfield Mine collapse in Tasmania on April 25, 2006, captured the attention of Australia. The collapse occurred when a small earthquake triggered an underground rock fall in the gold mine. At the time there were 17 people in the mine and 14 were lucky enough to escape immediately.

Three men were unaccounted for; Larry Knight, Brant Webb and Todd Russell. Larry had tragically been killed in the initial rock fall, but Brant and Todd were still alive, trapped in part of the telehandler in which they had been working.


Brant and Todd were partially buried under some rubble but were able to free themselves by cutting through their clothes and boots using Stanley knives. They had no way of knowing if rescue was coming or what had

happened to the other miners.

As the days went by they were able to survive by collecting groundwater that was seeping through the rock overhead in their helmets. It was not until April 30 that rescuers first heard Brant and Todd and knew they were

Rescue attempts were hampered by fears of further rock falls and rock five times harder than concrete made the rescue timeline unpredictable. A hole was drilled through which a PVC pipe was inserted allowing rescuers to send in fresh water, food and communications equipment. For eight long days this pipe was their connection to the outside world.

Finally, on May 9, Brant and Todd were freed after 14 days underground. On the same day the funeral of Larry was held, marking it as a day of both triumph and tragedy.



At the insistence of Fellin's brother Joe, who believed that the miners were still alive, a small borehole was drilled from the surface. After several days it was discovered that Henry and David had survived in a small, narrow chamber.

Rescuers dropped provisions to the miners and subsequent larger boreholes were made, including the final large hole which allowed the two surviving miners to be raised to the surface on August 27 after 14 days.

It was later discovered that the other miner Louis Bova, had gone in another direction and did not survive the cave-in. His body was never recovered.



SHEPPTON MINE

On August 13, 1963, the roof of the Sheppton anthracite coal mine collapsed and three miners were trapped below ground; Henry Throne, David Fellin and Louis Bova.

The miners were believed to be dead and rescue crews were unable to access the shaft because of the

There's a lot of stigma still attached to counselling that we need to abolish. Counselling is for everyone and for any reason. What makes counselling so effective is having an impartial third party see things that we can't, and then being able to provide advice and effective strategies.

Louise said that people think that if they attend counselling they will be judged or blamed but that's not the case at all. "It's a welcoming environment and it's all

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

Released in Australia the first quarter of 2016, this machine rounds out Caterpillar's range of purpose-built mining wheel loaders, that include the 992K and 993K. Superseding the 994H, this machine has been designed to load the 785, 789 and 793 haul trucks, making its mark with circa 20% increase payload capacity over its predecessor.

payload capacity, the 994K has been a major step change for Caterpillar, surpassing Komatsu's WA1200-6 in size. This scale increase, has improved productivity, resulting in fewer passes to load large mining trucks, offering rated payloads of 40.8 tonnes as a standard lift machine and 38.1 tonnes in high-lift configuration. When matched with the popular 793F, the highlift configured 994K can load this dump truck in six passes, five passes when matched with the 789 series truck and four when loading the 785. Depending upon mine and material, a range of buckets are available to ensure maximise loading efficiency is achieved.

Like the 24 Grader discussed in the last issue, the 994K has been designed with servicing in mind, with engine oil change intervals kept at 500 hour minimums as well as modular design assisting component changeouts.

Powered by Caterpillar's own 3516E engine, the



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


