From 2014 to 20167 the NSW Minerals Council proudly stood together with the Knights through some tough times for the team and for our Hunter coal miners.

This season the Knights showed some real improvement, fighting hard with the type of spirit and determination that Hunter miners can identify with. After some gutsy performances this year, the future looks pretty good for the Knights, with some exciting seasons in prospect.

IN THE SAME WAY, COAL MINING IN THE HUNTER IS IN BETTER SHAPE THAN A FEW YEARS AGO. COMMODITY PRICES ARE STABLE AND STRONG, AND DEMAND IS AT OR NEAR RECORD LEVELS. COAL MINING JOBS ARE ON THE RISE, WITH NEARLY 800 MORE COAL

In June, the NSW State Budget confirmed record mining royalties strengthening our State's economic position, helping fill a decline in stamp duty revenue from a slowing Sydney property market.

Mining royalties were revised up by \$813 million, delivering a record \$1.8 billion in this year alone and another record \$2 billion next year, to help fund improved services across the State. Total mining royalties are expected to be around \$7.4 billion over the next four years.

MINEWORKERS, UNIONISTS, POLITICIANS, INDUSTRY
REPRESENTATIVES AND FAMILY MEMBERS GATHERED TO PAY THEIR

MEMORIAL SERVICE ON SEPTEMBER 9.

No new names were added to over 1,800 listed on the Jim Comerford Memorial Wall in the 12 months leading up to the service. While that is a great relief, speakers warned there was no room for complacency when it comes to protecting workers' lives in the high-risk coal mining industry.

Federal Hunter MP Joel Fitzgibbon said mining had a long history in the

region but hadn't always delivered prosperity to the community.

"For most of its history the industry's employees were overworked and under-paid. In the earliest years they worked in the most appalling and dangerous environments. That changed as a result of the courage and determination of our early trade unionists."

Mr Fitzgibbon also warned vigilance and collective action was still necessary to defend against those conditions, like casualisation and the growing use of contractors. "Casualisation does not just affect wages and conditions but also has implications for workplace safety," he said.

PALMER'S POWER PLAN

Waratah Coal chairman Clive Palmer has launched a proposal to create a new 700MW coal-fired power station in the Galilee Basin, Queensland, in association with his company's Galilee Coal project.

Construction of the \$1.54 billion project will commence in 2020 to support the indevelopment Galilee Coal project located 30km north of Alpha.

"I am putting my money where my mouth is by announcing this new station, so we can power Queensland and help bring down energy costs which continue to escalate," Palmer said.

"At full scale, the project will comprise two open cut and four underground mines, as well as supporting infrastructure, and will produce 40 million tonnes per annum (Mtpa) of highquality thermal coal for export markets."

Let's hope this new Queensland coal-fired power station encourages our NSW Government to follow suit.

DERAILED

A Pacific National train hauling from Yancoal's Moolarben open-cut mine was struck by an empty Aurizon train on September 26 forcing the closure of the Hunter rail line until repairs could be made.

An official investigation is underway, yet the collision is thought to have been triggered by an empty wagon on an otherwise full train coming from Moolarben, which popped off the tracks into the path of the oncoming empty coal train.

No injuries occurred in the collision, but a trail of destruction was left on the tracks requiring extensive repairs while mines affected included Ulan, Wilpinjong, Moolarben, Mount Arthur, Bengalla, Drayton, Liddell and Maules Creek.

The NSW Office of Transport Safety Investigations and the Office of the National Rail Safety Regulator are examining the incident.

REGULATOR RULING

The Department of Planning and Environment's Resources Regulator has accepted an enforceable undertaking from Mangoola Coal following the Regulator's investigation into a workplace incident at the Mangoola Open Cut Mine in 2016 where a worker was injured when the cabin of an excavator dislodged and tipped off the side of the excavator, with the operator still inside.

The undertaking will provide training of all Mangoola maintenance workers and staff in human organisational factors in maintenance. Resources developed during the undertaking will also be made available to the broader mining industry to share the lessons learnt and enhance industry safety.

The undertaking will also fund community services and mobility for the elderly in the local community of Denman. Mangoola has also committed to pay the Regulator's costs of \$93,500 making the total value of the undertaking \$464,710.

CLASS ACTION CONTINUES

The mining industry is facing four new class actions alleging that more than 25,000 workers were not paid their proper entitlement, worth up to \$325 million.

The new class actions are being brought against the labour hire firms WorkPac, Programmed, HAYS and One Key whose workers were hired to provide labour for companies including BHP, Glencore, Anglo and Yancoal.

Principal of Adero law firm, Rory Markham said the workers would allege the companies were involved in systemic failures to pay accrued leave and other entitlements under the Black Coal Mining Industry Award and the Fair Work Act.

The new actions are an extension of two class actions already filed in the Federal Court against BHP and labour hire companies, TESA and Chandler McLeod, on behalf of workers at the Mt Arthur mine in the NSW Hunter Valley.

CASUAL CHANGES

In more news on the casual labour front, from October 1, some casual mining workers will be able to ask their employers for permanent positions if they have worked in that job for 12 months.

The ruling by the Fair Work Commission allows casuals mining workers who have worked regular hours for at least one year to have their application for a permanent position taken seriously by their employer. Under the ruling, a regular casual mining worker who has worked an average of 38 or more hours a week in the period of 12 months' casual employment may request to have their employment converted to full-time employment.

While the employer has a right to refuse to make a position permanent, they must have reasonable grounds and must discuss it with the employee. This could include that the position would likely not exist within the next 12 months, if the hours of work would likely drop, or if the days or times the employee works is expected to change.

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HAPPENING RIGHT IN OUR BACKYARD



CIVMEC IS BRINGING MAJOR MINING CAPABILITY WITH NEW TECHNOLOGY TO THE MINING INDUSTRY LIKE NEVER SEEN BEFORE. ONCE THEIR NEW FACILITY IS COMPLETED, AN EXTRA 400 JOBS WILL BE AVAILABLE IN THE REGION.

Civmec are a renowned company in the WA mining sector and have now made a home on the east coast, right here in our region. The facility with be the fourth for the Australian company adding to their existing Henderson and Broome Western Australia locations, and their Darwin facility.

"The facility here in Newcastle is about to have big changes. In WA we are well known in the mining industry for our ability to deliver, and it is heading in the same direction here on the east coast which is exciting," says Facility Manager Noel McCausland

ONCE THE COMPLETION OF THE EXTENSIVE EXPANSION OF THE FACILITY HAS TAKEN PLACE, CIVMEC IS EXPECTED TO INCREASE ITS WORKFORCE TO 500 PLUS EMPLOYEES.

The technology in the facility is something special and must be seen to be believed. "The metal comes in and traditionally it will look like an I Beam, all we do is make it in to something. We program the machine at the start to either cut or drill holes all with the touch of a button. We don't physically touch

any of it until its processed." Noel tells us.

Noel goes on to explain that the first process it goes through is shot blasting to clean it all up to look like brand new steel. Then it goes through to cutting, drilling and coping. How it's done everywhere else traditionally in the industry is a guy would come out with a tape measure, measure it, mark it out and put a line on it. A guy then comes along and tacks it on to that position, fits it out and then welds it out.

WHAT CIVMEC'S MACHINE DOES IS IT ACTUALLY SCRIBES IT. "SO, THERE'S NO MEASURING. THERE'S A MARK THERE FOR YOU, YOU PUT THE FITTING ON AND YOU WELD IT," SAYS NOEL.

Having been with Civmec now for 7 years, the last 12 months in Newcastle, Noel is excited to see the expansion at this facility as it will be everything plus more in new technology. "We're spending a lot of money expanding our fabrication here. What we will end up with is 20,000 sqm under our roof."

There are exciting times ahead for Civmec and our region!


The 2018 Forum will include a networking and information session for mining companies and local businesses across the Upper Hunter region.

Now he's where he wants to be in his mining career, and things are starting to take a positive direction for his acting career. He attributes being able to follow his dream to his mining job which is providing financial stability for his family.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PLANNING AND ENVIRONMENT ARE ISSUING AN ENFORCEABLE UNDERTAKING WARNING FOR THE HUNTER REGION.

The Enforceable Undertaking issued to Broken Head Quarry near Byron Bay was the first for the Department of Planning and Environment since the enactment of new provisions earlier this year.

Owners of a north coast NSW quarry have agreed to convert their exhausted site into bushland by mid-2019 in a landmark outcome that sends a strong message to companies and individuals in the Hunter region.

The Department's Executive Director of Resource Assessment and Compliance, Dr Oliver Holm, said companies and individuals in the Hunter need to be aware of this new enforcement measure.

"ENFORCEABLE UNDERTAKINGS ARE WRITTEN, LEGALLY BINDING AGREEMENTS THAT CAN SAVE THE SIGNIFICANT COSTS OF LEGAL ACTION AND BRING ABOUT THE SWIFT, CLEAR AND MEASURABLE RESULTS FOR THE COMMUNITY," HE SAID.

"Sometimes our compliance investigations can take two or three years, and early on we identify concerns that can be raised with the company or individual. Many organisations are willing to put their hand up, admit their wrongs and sign an agreement to take action and change their behaviour. They often include contributions to local community organisations or projects to offset potential impacts that may

have occurred as a result of the alleged contravention of the Act."

LEADSHINE PTY LIMITED, WHICH HAS OWNED THE BROKEN HEAD QUARRY SINCE 2003, HAS AGREED TO AN ENFORCEABLE UNDERTAKING TO REHABILITATE AND REVEGETATE THE LAND.

Dr Holm said the decision is a win for local people who have been concerned about the environmental condition of the quarry and its future for many years.

"The old quarry site will now be brought back to match the surrounding vegetation to protect threatened species as well as restore an important wildlife corridor. This is good news for the region, with such a positive environmental outcome secured through a clear and enforceable mechanism."

While Singleton has earmarked two projects with a combined total of \$13,353,000, we are asking the State Government for just half of the cost to deliver significant improvements for our community.

That includes \$4,853,000 for the next stage of upgrades to Singleton Town Centre, and perhaps most importantly to those people who travel to our local government area for work, an \$8.5

Upgrade Program.

Four major transport routes vital to workers driving to and from Singleton's 17 coal mines are included under the application, identified because they are vitally important in maintaining Singleton Council's road infrastructure to a level that is required to support our annual \$4.2 billion gross regional product.

Our application outlines detailed design work for a rehabilitation of Glendonbrook Road, which currently shows signs of wear and tear potholing, flushing, heaving and cracking. Plans for the Elderslie

pavement widening and improvement of curves of the eastern approach to the bridge along the existing embankment and cut batters, while a replacement of the Cessnock Road bridge includes bridge widening and curve improvement on the eastern approach. Upgrades to the bridge would significantly improve heavy vehicle movement and support regional heavy vehicle infrastructure.

Moses Crossing Bridge would also be targeted, adding a 70m concrete approach in the bed of the river and to strengthen a 1km section of pavement to the top of the riverbank. This area is regularly inundated by flood waters and requires regular maintenance. When the works are complete, the roadway will be safer for vehicles to use after flood waters recede.

I would appeal to the Deputy Premier and the man who oversees the Resources for Regions program, John Barilaro, to consider the impacts of these projects not if they go ahead, but if

they don't.

THERE CAN BE NO VALUE PUT ON THE PEACE OF MIND FOR WORKERS' FAMILIES THAT WILL COME FROM **KNOWING THE ROADS** THEIR LOVED ONES ARE **DRIVING ON ARE THE BEST** POSSIBLE STANDARD. **BECAUSE MORE IMPORTANT** THAN THE ROUTE TO WORK IS THE DRIVE HOME AGAIN.

But there is a very definite dollar value attached to the outputs from those workers who, simply by arriving at work safely and getting on with the job, deliver enormous benefits to every single person in NSW.

With a State election looming and an announcement yet to be made on the latest round of funding, I hope the decision-makers act on the intention of the Resources of Regions funding when they are considering Singleton's applications. And that is to consider the real impacts on the people who are very literally at the coalface.

LEARN FROM THE LAWMAN

STUART BARNETT IS OUR MINING INDUSTRY'S LEADING PERSONAL INJURY LAWYER. THIS MONTH HE HAS SOME IMPORTANT ADVICE IN RELATION TO DECIDING WHO TO APPOINT AS AN EXECUTOR IN YOUR WILL OR WHETHER TO BE THE EXECUTOR OF SOMEONE ELSE'S WILL.

Have you ever been asked by a family member or friend to be the executor of their will? Or when preparing your own will have you wondered what the executor is and what their duties are? It's an important question and one that will touch all of us in one way or the other.


IF YOU ARE ASKED TO BE AN **EXECUTOR THEN YOU WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR CARRYING OUT** THE WISHES OF YOUR FAMILY **MEMBER OR FRIEND AFTER THEY** DIE. LIKEWISE THE PERSON YOU APPOINT AS YOUR EXECUTOR WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR CARRYING **OUT YOUR WISHES WHEN YOU** DIE. THERE ARE LAWS THAT SET **OUT HOW AN EXECUTOR MUST ACT BUT IN GENERAL TERMS IT'S** ABOUT FAITHFULLY AND HONESTLY **CARRYING OUT THE WISHES OF THE** PERSON WHO HAS PASSED AWAY.

Some examples of the duties of the Executor include, the obvious first step of locating the will, potentially organising the funeral, determining the assets and liabilities of the deceased, working out whether it is necessary to formally apply for probate of the will, paying out any liabilities, managing and/ or distributing the assets to the beneficiaries, lodging tax returns and preparing final accounts and reports.

Depending upon how complex the affairs of the deceased are the role of executor may be simple and finalised in a relatively short period of time. On the other hand, the duties of the Executor can be onerous and take a considerable amount of time, even years, to discharge.

Sometimes the Executor also acts as a trustee, for example, if the deceased left young children then the Executor may need to hold and invest the children's' money or assets until the children are of age and able to take possession of the money or assets. This may even involve making decisions about advancing money to minor children for advancement in life.

BECAUSE OF THE IMPORTANCE OF THE ROLE AND THE POTENTIAL **COMPLEXITY IT IS IMPORTANT THAT**



YOU DISCUSS THE APPOINTMENT WITH THE PERSON WHO YOU PROPOSE TO APPOINT TO ENSURE THEY ARE WILLING TO ACT. YOU MAY APPOINT AN INDIVIDUAL OR SEVERAL PEOPLE, WHO MUST ALL BE OVER THE AGE OF 18 YEARS OR A CORPORATE EXECUTOR.

Some people appoint the Government agency in their State often called the Trustee and Guardian or Public Trustee. Remember that whilst all Executors can claim expenses, corporate Executors, the Trustee and Guardian and Public Trustee will always charge a fee, often a percentage of the value of the estate.

There are many things to consider when appointing an Executor, such as the age and capacity of the person to carry out their duties. A person considerably older than you may pass away themselves before you do or may simply be unable to cope with the role.

WHILST THE ROLE OF EXECUTOR MAY SOUND DAUNTING, IN **MANY CASES IT IS RELATIVELY** STRAIGHTFORWARD. OFTEN **EXECUTORS SEEK THE ASSISTANCE** OF A SOLICITOR TO ASSIST WITH THEIR DUTIES, FOR ADVICE AND TO PREPARE THE PAPERWORK. THOSE COSTS ARE PAID OUT OF THE ESTATE.

This is general advice and because your individual circumstances will vary I recommend seeking out specific advice for your needs.

Southern Cross LADS (Learn About Driving Skills) was conceived ten years ago following the tragic deaths of four young men in an accident on Broken Head Road near Byron Bay.

The idea is to build a driver training facility on land on the outskirts of Lismore where young drivers can receive expert training. Locally here in The Hunter we think that councils, schools, parents and pretty much anyone else would bend over backwards to make a version of our own

happen. We also think the LADS team would most likely allow us to use a lot of their plans already put together.

THE LISMORE TRACK WILL BE ABOUT 500 METRES IN CIRCUMFERENCE AND BUILT ON A 50-ACRE SITE ON THE OUTSKIRTS OF TOWN. IT WILL FEATURE VARIOUS ROAD CONDITIONS INCLUDING 'WET' CONDITIONS, ROUNDABOUTS FOR VISION AND STEERING TRAINING, CORNERS OF VARIOUS RADII, A

STRAIGHT SUFFICIENT FOR VEHICLES TO ACCELERATE TO 80KM/H, SAND TRAPS AND A SPECTATOR VIEWING AREA. A HUNTER VERSION COULD LOOK SIMILAR.

The full cost of the Lismore project is about \$800,000, which is not a lot of money when it comes to saving lives. It's also very achievable in context of getting a similar idea up and going in the Hunter. Through fees and government support the project would be self-sustaining and economically viable while providing some fulltime jobs as well.

A University of Queensland study, released in 2006, found that the cost of an accident was \$1.823 million when such things as emergency response, investigations, court cases, funerals and other factors were considered. So, if the project saved just one life it would be a success.

The driver education facility would be a community resource and be accessible to all road users in the Hunter mining area and beyond. A strong focus on year 11 and 12 students just getting their licenses would be the priority.

The objectives of the Driver Education Facility would be:

 Increase driver awareness of risks on the road;

- Build a driver's capacity for effective decision making; and
- Develop safe driving behaviour.

If we equip learner and provisional drivers with more hours in supervised driver training to teach kids low risk driving skills to heighten their hazard perception and to change their attitude towards driving, then the chances of having a crash will reduce dramatically.

The facility would be specially designed to deliver on key objectives through a combination of classroom and on-track training.

As well as providing some Green Offsets for developments, it could be an opportunity for Hunter garden clubs, Landcare and the mines' rehabilitation teams to have some fun.


Water security, mulch supply and a good aspect – out of those westerly winds – should do the trick.

Who are you and what do you do? My name is Kelly Hitchcock and I am an operator at Hunter Valley Operations. **Any nicknames good or bad?** They have just started calling me Hurricane Hitchcock.

Why is that a watercart thing?

No, because of my trainer that trained me on the shovel, his nickname is lightning, and the guy that he partnered up with they started calling him thunder. So, the show was named "Thunder and Lighting", and then when I got in they were like, "Well what are we going to call Kelly.... Hurricane Hitchcock."

Where do you live?

I live in Hunterview. I moved here because my mum was here.

When did you start and what's the ride been like?

I started in 2005 with a contracting company called Mining Earth Moving Services (MES) after being a stay at home mum. I was the second female employed and went in as a cleanskin, it was like maybe a few months before the Trainee programs started coming in. It's was tough, I often look back and think how the hell did I make it work. I have always been that sort of person who just won't give up. If it's something you want, you just go after it.

What's a usual day at work entail?

Early mornings! I'm not much of a morning person. I get up and head off to work about six. We start at half six and get out on the equipment.

How big is the crew?

There have been some changes, so I am not actually sure how many there are per crew at the moment.

What's the best thing about your job?

Probably the people that you meet. The friendships that you form. Your workmates. I work with the best bunch of people.

The worst thing?

I'd have to say day shift because of I kind of like the night shift. I actually think I get more sleep when I am on night shifts. Also rotating shifts because there are special occasions you just can't get time off for and

you have to miss. Not being able to go to all those family occasions.

How different is your job to what you wanted to be when you were a kid?

I have always been around machinery, so a job in mining was something I always wanted to do. I thought it was a bit out of reach trying to juggle it with a family, but once I became a single mum I was like what the hell, go for it. I can either be a single mom with three children and not be able to provide for them and let the government assist me for the rest of my life, or I can put my big girl undies on, get my act together and provide the life that I want my children to have.

How do you manage with the kids?

When they were little it was tough, but it needed to be done to provide for them. I started with in home care then I ended up with a nanny that would stay on my roster days. She had her own room and all of that. She would go home on her days off. I met her through the school that my girls are going to, and it just so happened that her dad was on my crew at work at the time, so I knew the family. I was like you look after the kids and make sure they are safe and happy, and I still took care of all the meals and housework. It was a battle with meal preps and washing and cleaning, so work was easy compared to that! The days off were just hectic with little kids and there were many days I would stay awake, so I didn't have to put them in care that last day.


Being able to attend school functions and activities on your days off when they were younger would've been a bonus too?

Yeah, I was massively involved with the kids and their functions at school and I still love getting involved with whatever I can with them. Shift work allows you the opportunity to be involved in community stuff with them. Though the flip side is you also miss out on activities when you are rostered on.

Ok, so family now?

Yeah, it's my husband and he's got three sons, so they are 24, 22, and 20, and then there is me and my 3 girls. The girls are 20, 17, and 15. We are like the Brady Bunch!





COURAGEOUS CO

THIS MONTH WE BRING YOU ANOTHER STORY OF A MINER WHO NEVER MADE IT HOME FROM THE GREAT WAR BUT WHO WILL BE REMEMBERED THANKS TO THE BRANXTON GRETA MEMORIAL CYCLEWAY.

Private Charles Thomas Pickering Smith became known as more than just CTP Smith on the Greta cenotaph when a gold pendant with his name was donated to

the museum. It had been found in a local garden twenty-five years earlier. Fortunately, his story was able to be discovered because his parents gave him three

Christian names which stood out from all the other Smiths.

Charles lived in Greta with his parents, William and Margaret, and younger sister Alice, and was the only son who had survived from birth. He also had an older married sister, Mary. He enlisted on the 3rd September 1915, aged 21

years. His trade was recorded as miner and labourer and he had already spent two years in the local militia, the 14th Infantry of the Citizen Military Forces so there is no doubt he was eager to do his part.

After their medical examination and basic training Charles and another local, Signaller W. Hatcher, were given a send-off on their final leave, in the Greta Central Hall. Both Private

Smith and Signaller Hatcher were then given inscribed gold pendants on behalf of Greta's citizens.

CHARLES SET OFF FROM SYDNEY ON THE 8TH MARCH 1916 FOR FIGHTING OVERSEAS. HIS REGIMENTAL SERVICE NUMBER WAS 4884, AND HIS UNIT WAS **THE 54TH AUSTRALIAN** INFANTRY BATTALION. HE **WAS A SLIGHTLY BUILT** YOUNG MAN, WEIGHING **49 KILOS AND A HEIGHT** OF 167CM. HE HAD A DARK **COMPLEXION, BLACK HAIR** AND BROWN EYES.

Just over four months after leaving, Charles was killed at the front in France, on the 20th July 1916. Although his mother Margaret Lawson was his recorded next-of-kin it was his father, William, who was reported to have received the message from

the Minister of Defence to say his son had perished. The Newcastle Morning Herald and Miners' Advocate also reported on the 14th August, the current tally of who were killed and wounded, which had mounted to 11 of Greta's volunteer soldiers already dead, with 30 injured.

Charles was buried in the Rue-Petillon Military Cemetery in Fleurbaix (Flerbay) in France. Sadly, his parents would not have had the money to travel to visit his grave site, but they did receive three copies of a photograph of their late son's grave, whose headstone was eventually marked with his mother's words "In Memory of Dearly Loved Son of Mr and Mrs M L Smith of Greta".

WHAT'S IN A NAME? **MOUNT THORLEY**

HAVE YOU EVER BEEN DRIVING AROUND THE MOUNT THORLEY AREA AND WONDERED WHERE THE SOARING PEAK THAT IT WAS NAMED FOR IS LOCATED? WELL WONDER NO MORE - IT HASN'T SUCCUMBED TO MINING, IT NEVER EXISTED!

According to Lyn MacDonald, the author of a history of the Thorley family, there are two possible origins for the name. Philip Thorley, who received the initial land grant in the early 1800s, was a keen jockey who won the first New South Wales Gold Cup race held in Sydney. Philip's connection with horse racing is one

suggestion for why he gave his property its name.

The second possibility comes from an order given by a neighbour who was assisting him with boundary marking. Noticing that Thorley had dismounted his horse for a brief rest, the neighbour turned to him and said, "Come on, mount Thorley!"

Either way, next time you're thinking of abbreviating the name, remember that there's no mountain connection to Mount Thorley, just a tribute to our early pioneer's love for and reliance on the trusty steed!



"We are really thrilled to be in a comp that puts our skills to the test against the best teams around the world."

Despite an outstanding performance by the Wambo team, the competition was won by Russian team Kemerovo MRS. Well done Wambo!

Hearing loss is the fourth largest cause of disability worldwide and has become so prevalent that even the World Health Organisation has taken notice. A recent report is predicting that disabling hearing loss will affect about 13% of the world population by 2030 and one in four Australians by 2050.

IDENTIFIED AS ONE OF THE BIGGEST RISK FACTORS IS NOISE-INDUCED OR INDUSTRIAL HEARING LOSS, WHICH, DESPITE BEING ENTIRELY PREVENTABLE, CONTINUES TO BE ALL TOO COMMON. FOR THOSE IN OUR INDUSTRY SUCH AS TECHNICIANS, TRADES WORKERS, MACHINERY OPERATORS, DRIVERS AND LABOURERS, THE EXPOSURE RISK IS VERY HIGH.

The danger with hearing loss is that it often occurs gradually through prolonged exposure to moderate or loud noise levels, so by the time sufferers notice a change in their hearing, the irreversible damage has already been done. Hearing loss may present itself as tinnitus, the hearing of phantom sounds, like ringing or static; or as hyperacusis, a reduction in tolerance for ordinary sounds.

These conditions are often debilitating for the sufferer and can lead to feelings of isolation, depression and if left untreated, even dementia in later life. Once recognising potential hearing loss, it takes sufferers on average seven years to seek professional help, so it is critical that prevention is a high priority.



The employer is responsible for preventing over exposure to hazardous noise, which means not exposing a worker to sounds of more than 85 decibels over an eight-hour shift, nor to any sound above 140 decibels at any time. Personal protective equipment (PPE) also plays a critical role in preventing permanent industrial hearing loss.

There is a wide range of hearing protectors currently available. When selecting hearing protection, audiologist for Honeywell Industrial Safety, Theresa Schulz recommends measuring each individual's daily protected exposure level, rather than using the labelled attenuation of the PPE to estimate how much protection workers should be getting from the hearing protector. Using the labelled attenuation is far less accurate, and can often lead to overprotection, which puts workers at risk of serious workplace accidents. 'Communication, comfort, size, shape and ease of insertion should all be considered when selecting hearing protection,' says Schulz. So, when it comes to hearing

So, when it comes to hearing protection, make sure your PPE is properly fitted, meets the requirements of the working environment and you are wearing the equipment properly because it's not worth the risk.

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





HITACHI'S DIGGERS HAVE ALWAYS BEEN HELD IN HIGH REGARD IN AUSTRALIA. IN THE VALLEY, THEY OPERATE ACROSS MANY SITES THAT BY AND LARGE INCLUDE THEIR POPULAR EX2600, EX3600 AND EX5600.

This however has not traditionally been the case with their range of rigid dump trucks, that until recently represented a mere fraction of the domestic haul truck population.

A bold move and perhaps masterful stroke, differing from their competitors that outsource this core technology to third-party providers.

The result, Hitachi's Drive Control System, with claims of reduced tire slippage on acceleration, tire lock-up during braking as well as preventing chassis oscillation in a front-rear direction and tyre skid while steering; some of the problems that plagued their earlier series trucks.

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

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



SO WHERE DID THE NAME YELLOW BILLY COME FROM?





Initially I thought I'd take spin up Merriwa way to inhale one or five of my favourites, but being an adventurer even Russell Coight bows before, I decided to wander further a field and hung a left at Bylong Valley Way just before Sandy Hollow.

As the Kingswood roared up this well beaten twisty tourist trail, she said to me in a secret language only the two of us understand 'Oh great leader...let's make this a trip to remember'.

WITH A GENTLE KNOWING NOD, I UNDERSTOOD AND THEN THE SPIRIT OF THE DEARLY DEPARTED BURT REYNOLDS ENTERED MY BODY IN A SMOKY AND THE BANDIT KIND OF WAY. I PICKED UP THE CB RADIO AND TOLD THE UHF WORLD OF TRUCKIES AND TOOTHLESS CARAVANNERS TO CLEAR THE WAY... WE'RE GOIN' ON A PIE CRAWL.

It's well worth the 650k drive to experience what could well be Australia's best pie or at least a top 5 hall of fame legend of the pie game. Make the trip.

With a gut full of pies, I had done it. I found a pie of greatness and with that I shoved a Johnny Cash cassette in the tape deck and set the Kingswood on the road home. As they say...a life well travelled is a life well lived.

Taste: Very malty for a lager, different but I like it!


Mouth: Full bodied.

Arriving at the Regatta Centre I am bursting with excitement, all I can think is how cool this is going to be. I meet with my instructor and he gives me a briefing about safety and equipment, explaining the 5-point safety harness that straps you into the backpack unit. Water is propelled from the powered unit into a 20 metre hose which is forced into the 2 jet nozzles which creates the power to lift you out of the water.

Then as he goes through some safety precautions he mentions what to do if I propel myself under the water. Don't panic is the most important thing to remember, he says. What? Underwater? I'll be on the comms the whole time. You're going to have so much fun!"
