TAP GETTING TIGHTER

Water restrictions are getting even tougher in the New England region. From now Tamworth, Moonbi and Kootingal are moving to Level 5 water restrictions.

Nundle is on level 4 restrictions, Tenterfield is already on level 4.5 and Armidale will move to level 5 restrictions on October 1.

Murrurundi remains on Level 6 restrictions with 50 percent of water being trucked in by 4 to 6 trucks a day and the remainder coming from an emergency water bore.

So far 14 kilometres of the Scone to Murrurundi pipeline has been laid, the \$14.2 million project will see 40 kilometres of pipeline built from Scone to Murrurundi, as well as pump stations and reservoirs built along the stretch.

DAVID BOSHOFF GONESKIES BHP Mount Arthur's General Manager

David Boshoff is off to the Adani mine in Queensland.

BHP announced after three years he would be resigning and is expected to finish on November 15.

David will be the Project Director for the Adani Carmichael Mine and Rail Project and then take on the Chief Operating Officer role.

Police are investigating a suspected murder suicide near Jerrys Plains.

Hunter Valley Police District officers say at about 4pm Thursday 26 September they were called to a property on Doyles Creek Road and discovered the bodies of a 48-year-old man and a 49-year-old woman both suffering gunshot wounds. Police are awaiting the results of post mortems, but at this stage believe it was

CFMEU LAUNCHES ATTACK ON BHP

The CFMEU has launched an advertising offensive against BHP and their new form of employment, Operations Services.

BHP said the new program would employ permanent workers on market competitive rates for jobs that would normally be outsourced to labor hire companies.

But the mineworkers union has labelled it as a "cheap move by the big Australian".

"We've accused BHP many years ago of being very aggressive about converting good permanent jobs at the Mount Arthur mine into casual hire labor," said CFMEU northern

district mining and energy secretary Peter Jordan.

The CFMEU also said there is a \$53,000 difference between an employee at the mine and one through Operations Services.

"It's a cheap deceptive deal about permanent work," said Peter Jordan According to the union there's

also issues with work being unsafe and workers being taxied in from outside of the area just to fill the positions.

BHP has given comment, denying people are being taxied in and also adding that everyone is being paid above the award wage.

REWARD FOR INFORMATION ON IAN PULLEN'S DEATH

The NSW Government has announced a \$350,000 reward for any information on the tragic hit and run death of Ian Pullen near Singleton

The New Zealander, aged 43, was found at 5:35am on Saturday 29 September on the side of Carrington Road, Glenridding.

Inquiries suggest Mr Pullen had been struck and killed by a car with the driver fleeing the scene without rendering assistance.

"He was here as a volunteer firefighter ahead of what was going to be a tough bushfire season," said Crime Manager Detective Acting Inspector

"What's not lost on the Singleton community is that he was here helping." Police believe there are people who know more and are urging them to come forward.

Prime Minister Scott Morrison announced 13 more Councils would be added to the Drought Communities

Upper Hunter Shire and Muswellbrook have already received funding, but Singleton missed out again.

"Scott Morrison says Muswellbrook is in drought but Singleton is not and everyone in the Singleton community including the Mayor knows that not to be true and yet he gave the same level of funding to Moyne Shire Council in Victoria and the Mayor there says look we're not in drought, we don't need this money," said Joel Fitzgibbon.

Joel Fitzgibbon said he fears the Coalition isn't giving Labor held seats funding.

"Those represented by Nats are getting money even though they don't need it, now we'll give the government the benefit of the doubt but I think they need to clarify this question."

KEPCO SPENT BIG FOR NOTHING

It's been the talk of the Bylong Valley for some time now, and now the IPC has rejected the proposal from Korean mining company KEPCO who were looking to develop an open cut and underground mine producing up to 120 million tonnes of coal over 25

The company spent \$750 million developing the project after they bought the exploration license from Anglo American in 2010.

The IPC rejected it for a number of reasons and concerns about the "longlasting environmental, agricultural and heritage impacts".

The NSW Minerals Council CEO Stephen Galilee has labelled the decision as a "lost opportunity" for the



GLENDELL MINE IS SEEKING APPROVAL TO CONTINUE CURRENT OPEN CUT MINING TO THE NORTH OF ITS EXISTING CUSTOMERS, PROPOSING TO RELOCATE THE HISTORICAL RAVENSWORTH HOMESTEAD.

Mining activities at Glendell Mine commenced in 2008, currently with approval to mine up to 4.5 million tonnes per annum of coal resources through to June 2024. The Glendell Continued Operations Project hopes to continue operations within a new area located to the north to produce an additional 135 Mt of additional coal through to 2044.

Along with proposed mining operations, construction activities, benefits and conceptual final landform, the project includes the proposal to relocate the Ravensworth Homestead to a

The Ravensworth Homestead is a collection of buildings built in the 19th century, considered to have State significant heritage values as a

remnant of an early pastoral station that retains evidence of the colonial period of development.

A number of important historic persons have been associated with the estate, including Colonial Surgeon, Dr James Bowman, for whom the homestead was constructed in 1832.

OPTIONS FOR THE RAVENSWORTH HOMESTEAD KEEPING ITS HERITAGE AND THE SURROUNDED COMMUNITY AT THE TOP OF THEIR MINDS.

One option is to relocate the buildings, intact, to a newly created 'Ravensworth Farm' site that is located adjacent to Bowmans Creek and the proposed Hebden Road realignment. The Homestead and associated buildings would be used by Glencore for administration purposes,

of course with the idea of it becoming a rural homestead post-mining to support its strong heritage focus.

The second option is to relocate to McNamara Park in Broke Village, functioning as a village square and creating administration and exhibition space, café and restaurant, cellar/door wine tasting, market space and space for annual events. This option has a major focus on community, with relocating requiring the dismantling of buildings 'stone-bystone' and rebuilding in the new location.

Both options focus on the heritage of the estate and the community, with Glencore establishing a community-based committee, the Ravensworth Homestead Advisory Committee, to assist with its assessment.

The detail and thought process that has gone into the Glendell Continued Operations Project, including the careful consideration of relocating Ravensworth Homestead, has had a major community focus.





"We also have a series of high-resolution cameras which reduce the response time of investigations. It's a big site here and by using the cameras we can identify the problem quickly. With all this information we are in a much better position to implement the best controls rapidly."

Kris says that BHP is looking to roll out the new system across other Australian sites, and is also sharing its advantages with neighbours Mount Pleasant and Bengalla, which continue to work with them on dust management.

"What's really great about receiving this award is that it recognises the joint efforts of many teams working together. LEARN THE LAWMAN


STUART BARNETT IS OUR MINING INDUSTRY'S LEADING PERSONAL INJURY LAWYER. THIS MONTH HE HAS SOME IMPORTANT **ADVICE IN RELATION TO THE USE OF MOBILE PHONES WHILST** DRIVING OR RIDING.

Recently the NSW Government has announced the rollout of fixed and relocatable trailer mounted cameras that can detect a motorist using their mobile phone whilst driving. There will be no warning signs about the existence of the camera. The trials indicate that a significant number of motorists will come under surveillance. The rollout will commence in December and for the first three months those detected will receive a warning letter but after that fines will apply.

The fine for using a mobile phone whilst driving is currently \$344 or \$457 if you are detected in a school zone. There is however a potentially more serious ramification for drivers in that the offence also carries 5 demerit points against your license, that means 10 demerit points during a double demerit period such as over a long weekend. For some motorists that could mean the suspension of their license if they are already carrying some demerit points.

Motorists who hold a full license can make or answer a call, play music from the phone or use it as a navigation aid ONLY if the phone is in a cradle fixed to the car and does not obscure your vision of the road and ONLY if it can be operated without you touching any part of the phone, so by voice activation or Bluetooth. If you are a Learner or P plate driver then you cannot use a phone at all in any circumstances whilst operating a vehicle.

Whilst you are permitted to have a phone in your pocket if you hold an unrestricted license you can only use it if you can do so without touching it, on the other hand the phone cannot be on your lap or in any other way in contact with your body.

It is interesting to note that the Government is moving towards digital licenses, that is, a driver's license can, in some circumstances be stored digitally in your phone. However, it would be an offence to touch the phone for the purpose of showing your license to a police officer BEFORE the police officer instructs you to do so. So. if you have a digital license and are pulled over don't rush to get the license up on the screen, wait to be told to

There are many rules around the use of phones in cars, those mentioned are just a taste and what it demonstrates is that it's a complicated area of the motor traffic law. It's been done for our safety on the road and perhaps the simplest way to avoid falling foul is to leave the phone alone and have it out of reach when driving.

I SUSPECT SOME MOTORISTS MISTAKENLY BELIEVE THAT IF YOU ARE STOPPED IN THE LINE OF TRAFFIC THAT IT IS OK TO HANDLE THE PHONE. THE LAW SAYS THAT YOU CANNOT. IF YOU WANT TO HANDLE THE PHONE YOUR VEHICLE MUST BE PARKED OUT OF THE LINE OF TRAFFIC. TO BE COMPLETELY SAFE FROM A FINE THAT MEANS ENGINE OFF AND PARK BRAKE ON.

BROCK MENDYK IS A COALMINER AT BULGA COAL, AND AFTER TRAGICALLY LOSING BOTH HIS FATHER AND YOUNGER SISTER TO SUICIDE NOW WORKS TIRELESSLY TO INSPIRE AND RAISE AWARENESS TO HELP OTHERS THAT MAY BE DOING IT TOUGH.

Brock Mendyk grew up in a tight and happy family of 6, with his dad Peter, mother Vicki, 2 younger brothers Bailey and Callan and younger sister Chelsey in Maitland, NSW.

In 2017, Brock and his family's lives were turned upside down following the loss of their loving father and husband Peter. "In December 2017 I was on my way to my work Christmas party as I got a call to go straight to my parents' house but wasn't sure why," said Brock.

"AS I ARRIVED THERE WERE AMBULANCES OUT THE FRONT AND I WAS TOLD MY DAD HAD TRIED TO TAKE HIS LIFE. WE RUSHED TO THE HOSPITAL TO SEE DAD LYING THERE AND WAS TOLD THERE WAS NOTHING MORE THEY COULD DO."

From that day onwards, the family's lives changed forever. No one saw any of it coming, with Brock describing his dad as a bright and happy man who loved life, was always going on holidays and always working hard to provide his family with the best life possible. "He was definitely the backbone of our family and always had the answer to any of our problems," said Brock.

"We felt safe when he was around, but deep down he must have been struggling with his own issues but kept it very secure."

Still grieving from the loss of Peter just 5 months later, Brock's younger sister Chelsey also took her own life. "This instantly tore us apart, losing our dad/husband, our sister/


Brock started to go down a bad path following the loss of his father and younger sister, but one day decided to change that path and create his own, focusing on the future and not his past. "I had to focus on what I could control which is my reaction to what has happened."

"I REMEMBERED BACK TO BOTH OF THEIR VIEWINGS BEFORE THE FUNERALS, THE LAST TIME I SAW THEM AND WHAT MY LAST 3 THINGS I SAID TO THEM WERE - "I LOVE YOU", "I WILL DO MY BEST TO MAKE YOU PROUD" AND "I WILL DO EVERYTHING I CAN TO LEAD MY MOTHER **AND 2 BROTHERS IN THE RIGHT** DIRECTION."

"Seeing my mum lose her lifetime partner since she was 15 years old tore me apart and I could not put any more stress on her."

Following the tragedies, Brock and his two best mates Jai Brook and Jye Dorsett started a clothing brand called AFTRMTH active, with the aim to inspire through the brand, raise awareness and help people through difficulties they may be facing.

"I PERSONALLY WANT TO SHOW PEOPLE THAT NO MATTER WHAT TERRIBLE THINGS YOU HAVE TO FACE IN LIFE THERE IS THE OPTION TO GO UPHILL NOT JUST DOWNHILL AND IF I CAN KEEP MOVING AFTER WHAT HAS HAPPENED OTHERS CAN TO." SAID BROCK.



Brock's family has also work hard to do what they can to help and break the stigma. Brock's mother Vicki organised a high tea fundraiser for suicide awareness where they raised \$15,000 for Lifeline to help them help people that are suicidal and those with mental health issues.

Brock was also an ambassador for Anytime Fitness Greenhills for their 'R U OK' Fundraiser earlier this year, currently in the process of helping a close family friend organise a men's mental health fundraiser golf day. "Although nothing we possibly can do can change our situation, we are doing our best to try and minimise other families having to go through what we have," said Brock.

Liddell Coal Operations also approached Brock and Vicki to give a talk to their crews about their story





to raise awareness in the industry, and gave their first talk late September, with more talks organised for October. According to a report by the Australian Bureau of Statistics in 2017 roughly 45 men will take their own lives this week and that number continues to rise.

ON THE LIFELINE WEBSITE YOU WILL FIND THAT BLOKES MAKE UP AN **AVERAGE SIX OUT OF EVERY EIGHT** SUICIDES EVERY SINGLE DAY IN **AUSTRALIA. THE NUMBER OF MEN** WHO DIE BY SUICIDE IN AUSTRALIA **EVERY YEAR IS NEARLY DOUBLE THE** NATIONAL ROAD TOLL.

"Suicide is starting to be more spoken about now and people are starting to speak up but personally I believe the older generations that have been brought up in a time that men are made believe they need to be tough and not show emotions needs to be thrown out and that has to be changed," said Brock.

"I'm not saying that if you are in a dark place letting someone you know is going to make it instantly go away but it will make people aware of what's going on and make a massive difference to overcome the situation and it could make another 25 year old like myself not have to go through this or your loved ones."

"We only get one life, so together we need to help make that last as long as possible."



BECOME HALLMARKS OF OUR REGION. There's no evidence that John Howe named St Patricks Plains in honour of the primary patron saint of Ireland, but history has recorded it was indeed Howe and his

party that opened the route between Windsor and the

Hunter and sowed the seeds for European settlement.

The richness of the luxuriant plains of the middle reaches of the Hunter River have sustained Aboriginal societies for thousands of years, with evidence of artefacts at ancient camp sites along creeks.

So too the promise of rich land fit for cultivation, along with an overland route between Wallis Plains and Windsor, captured the imagination of Governor Macquarie and a number of exploration parties that set out to cut through the precipitous rocky mountains.

And so it was that Howe, after an attempt the previous year, set out from Windsor on 5 March 1820 at the helm of an unusually large party comprising George Loder junior, Daniel Philips, Jeremiah Butler, Samuel Marshall, Nicholas Connely, Frederick Rhodes, James House, Robert Bridle, Andrew Loder, Thomas Dargin junior, Philip Thorley, two Aboriginal trackers Myles and Mullaboy, and the man who would eventually give his name to the settlement, Benjamin Singleton.

WHILE HARD EVIDENCE DOES NOT EXIST, HISTORY HAS WRITTEN THAT HOWE AND HIS PARTY TRAVERSED BULGA AND CROSSED TO THE LOWER PART OF WOLLOMBI BROOK TO COME UPON THE HUNTER RIVER AT WHITTINGHAM ON 15 MARCH 1820, **BESTOWING THE NAME "ST PATRICK'S** PLAINS" IN HONOUR OF THE FORTHCOMING ST PATRICK'S DAY TWO DAYS' HENCE.

What does survive is Howe's report back to Governor Macquarie, written from Wallis Plains (modern day Maitland) some days later on 21 March 1820. Howe wrote that he "embraced the earliest opportunity to inform Your Excellency that I reached the river on Wednesday last, the 15th instant", and, on the party's way down the river, "we came thro as fine a country as imagination can form".

Howe may lay claim to leading the successful expedition, but it was Benjamin Singleton, the son of a convict,

who is credited as establishing the township. By 1824, Benjamin and his wife Mary were well established on his grant of 240 acres at a natural ford over the Hunter River. There they built an inn and a mill on the banks of the river described as "very steep, and certainly not as wide as they are now", according to Allen Wood's Dawn in the


Benjamin added to his own land grant by acquiring an adjoining 100 acres, and thereafter in the Sydney Gazette on 2 January 1836, an advertisement appeared for 103 quarter acre allotments offered for sale in what would be known as Singleton (A Private Town).

HOWEVER, DEPRESSION STRUCK THE COLONY IN THE 1840S AND BENJAMIN BECAME BANKRUPT IN 1842. HE DIED IN SINGLETON ON 3 MAY 1853 AND WAS BURIED AT WHITTINGHAM CEMETERY. THE MAITLAND MERCURY DESCRIBED HIM AS "A MAN OF FRUGAL AND TEMPERATE HABITS WHOSE ONLY FAULT WAS THAT HE WAS A GREATER FRIEND TO **EVERYONE THAN HIMSELF".**


To experience Benjamin Singleton's Singleton, start in Pearce's Park, beside the Dunolly Bridge, where the Barley Mow, or later the Plough Inn looked onto Campbell Street and about where the mill wheel cut into the river. Then head down John Street, which may or may not have been named for Benjamin's son, the first European baby to be born in the area.

Turn left at Bourke Street and head to Burdekin Park, which Benjamin Singleton donated to the town for a market square and where he erected, at his own expense, a courthouse and jail which stood in front of the current Singleton Museum.

Soon after, Glenn left the army and moved into the mining industry. "In the mining industry I was doing the same thing, but I was drawing those mishaps on the walls of the crib hut," said Glenn.

"People would come in and look and have a laugh about it not knowing who it was originally - so all those pictures for many years were on the wall but in the end the manager wanted to clean the crib huts and they all got painted over unfortunately."

Always using his talents to draw for others, Glenn decided to put some of his own stories to paper after many years in the mining industry and travelling. "I have all this information in my head, it's just endless," said Glenn.

SO, GLENN DECIDED TO PUT OUT THE WARR ON MINING, FOR NOT ONLY THOSE IN THE MINING INDUSTRY, BUT ALSO FOR THE WIDER COMMUNITY. IT'S A BOOK THAT ANYONE CAN ENJOY.

Amazingly, Glenn is a self-taught cartoonist with memories right back to his schooling days of going above and beyond with his artwork. 





to the Museum to sit down with Brian's niece Jennifer Collier and Coalfields Heritage Group Secretary, Lexie Matthews, to learn the history of the man who was dedicated to preserving

BRIAN'S BIOGRAPHY IS NOT A SIMPLE NOR SHORT ONE. THIS SELFLESS AND HARDWORKING MAN LED AN **EXTREMELY ACTIVE LIFE, ACHIEVING** MANY AWARDS AND ACCOLADES. **BRIAN DIED AT THE AGE OF 76 AFTER SPENDING OVER FOUR DECADES** CONTRIBUTING TO, AND CONSERVING THE HISTORY OF THE HUNTER.

Born in 1943 in Moree, Brian left school at 15 as his parents could not afford to continue his education fees. He started as a Technician in Training with the Postmaster's General Department and went on to have a very successful career. At the age of 49 he took a redundancy along with thousands of others in the industry and because of many year's hard work and smart investment he was able to retire and settle in Kurri Kurri.

Although his writing career began in 1984 when he recorded the history of the Hunter's Mulbring Valley, it was on retirement that Brian began to dedicate himself completely to recording and preserving the Hunter's history

"He was always looking for a new venture to sink his teeth into," says Lexie. "He never stopped and was always looking to fill in the gaps of the Hunter's history and more than anything he loved sharing that history with other people. He would always say to us, you have to talk to people. There's always more to learn."

JENNY SHARED SOME INSIGHTS INTO THE MAN HIMSELF. "FROM AN EARLY AGE BRIAN WAS **ALWAYS INQUISITIVE, ASKING QUESTIONS AND** SEEKING ANSWERS. HE ALWAYS WANTED TO KNOW MORE. HIS PASSION FOR HISTORY REALLY **BEGAN WHEN HE STARTED RESEARCHING HIS** OWN FAMILY HISTORY. THAT PASSION FOR KNOWLEDGE GREW AND GREW.

"But there was so much more to him," Jenny fondly recalls. "Even though he was a single man for his whole life, he was very family orientated. Most people only saw the serious side of him, but us kids got to see the other side. He was also very generous, and not just with his money, but with his time."

Brian's generosity extended beyond just his family. The Museum is largely funded due to Brian. For the 19 years he was Treasurer, he personally raised over \$90,000. Then when Coal Services commissioned him to research and write a book detailing every colliery to ever exist in the NSW,

he declined payment and instead Coal Services paid \$50,000 to the Museum.

"THIS IS WHAT KEEPS US OPERATING," SAYS LEXIE. "THESE SELFLESS ACTS ARE WHO HE WAS. WE HAVE BEEN PROUD TO BE ABLE TO TELL PEOPLE THERE IS NO CHARGE TO COME INTO THE MUSEUM. THAT'S THANKS TO **BRIAN'S GENEROSITY."**

An active member of the Catholic Church, Brian served on his local Pastoral Council and was a scripture teacher and local area Coordinator for more than 10 years, enriching the lives of thousands of children. He was a Member of the Kurri Kurri Probus Club for over 20 years and served as their President in 2001. All of the volunteer work Brian did for churches and schools and community organisations, everything from guest speaking to radio talks to heritage tours, was all done entirely gratis.

Brian received the Inaugural State Heritage Volunteers Award in 2003, has sat numerous times on the Cessnock City Council's Cultural Heritage Committee and was awarded the Order of Australia in 2009 for his community work. In his last days Brian became the first person to be awarded a Lifetime Member of the Coalfields

"It wasn't a major award like those he has received, rather, it was a service award from his team. The people who really understood just how significant a contribution he has made. On the night before he passed, he was seen sleeping holding tightly to his trophy, so I like to think this last award meant the most to him," says Lexie.

Over the years Brian produced numerous journals, over 180 books and countless newspaper features. He personally researched and produced over 1 million pages on various aspects of the Hunter's history as well as being acknowledged in the work of many others. What an incredible contribution to the Hunter and what an amazing legacy he leaves behind.

Recently Kirsty won a scholarship through Chief Executive Women, allowing her to attend the Leading for Results program at the INSEAD Business School in Singapore. She's also a big advocate for women in mining and would like to see more women enter the mining industry in the future as it provides an opportunity to grow, travel and establish a successful career.

Kirsty shared a lot of insightful knowledge, but the most important advice she had was not to be scared to jump into things that you're not sure about, because being out of your depth is a good thing.

FROM FIRST JOB TO NOW

in Adelaide in her local community however her first job in mining was at the age of 20 as a "fieldy" at North Parkes Mine which 6 months later lead her into a full time Geology role after completing her Science/Geology Degree. Kirsty tossed up mining and medicine for a potential career path but decided on mining as a result of the challenges involved and her attraction to the outdoors.

Kirsty has worked in mining for over 16 years in roles including long term planning, geoscience, projects, engineering and management roles and all have helped her build up the experience needed to manage a mining operation. Kirsty has also studied extensively and holds degrees in Geoscience, Mining Engineering along with an MBA resulting in ten years of studying.

A TYPICAL WORKDAY

Kirsty starts her workday at the Production pre-start meeting and

KIRSTY LIDDICOAT IS MT ARTHUR'S then typically heads into the mining operation to review the site safety and production performance. Depending on the day Kirsty also checks in with the services on site including the pump crew and rehabilitation team. Kirsty then attends the daily production meeting providing feedback and advice to the team. From there Kirsty spends time with her people, solving problems, identifying production opportunities, working with the marketing team or co-chairing the diversity and inclusion team.

CHANGES AND CHALLENGES AHEAD

Kirsty believes that the biggest challenges facing the mining industry include the social license to operate a mine given the increasing pressure to reduce the impact on the environment and to work closer with local communities. Kirsty also believes that technology is going to fundamentally change the Kirsty's very first job was a paper route environment in which mines operate, resulting in a skill set change across the industry where the challenge will be in transitioning the current workforce into a more technology augmented world. Kirsty is of the opinion there will be a greater need for roles based around instrument technology and IT and this should be considered now at a school level. Kirsty was involved in the first autonomous pit in Australia, and has seen the safety benefits automation brings.

JOB PROS AND CONS

Kirsty believes that the best thing about her job is the people and being able to aid in their development, skills and witnessing their achievements. Conversely, she also believes that managing people can also be the worst part about her job as some of the decisions she has to make in her role can be very difficult. Kirsty also does a lot of mentoring in house with BHP and

externally through women in mining and states that as a result of her fortunate career in mining that it is important to give back and help others experience

ALWAYS LEARNING

Kirsty states that she has been given a lot of great advice over the years but for her "just give it a go" is up there with the best. In relation to leadership "find your own way, there are no set rules written for leadership".

Like us all Kirsty has expressed she has had her share of failures, big and small but what is most important

is learning from the failure and implementing that learning to prevent something similar happening in the future.


At the INSEAD Program in Singapore Kirsty was exposed to people from sectors such as farming and finance, with this allowing her to broaden her thinking in non-conventional ways. In relation to the actual content of the course, Kirsty gained insights around the importance of presence, communication, influencing and networking and how these skills can be implemented effectively to achieve results.

Who are you and what do you do?

My name is Jordyn Hunter I'm 25 and I work as a Dispatcher at Hunter Valley Operations coal mine. Any nicknames good or bad?

Nothing out of the ordinary, I mostly get Jordo or

Where do you live and how long have you been in the Valley?

I have lived in the Hunter Valley my whole life born and raised in Branxton. I currently live in East Maitland though, where I purchased my first house last year. I live with my loveable golden Labrador Ollie.

When did you start and what's the ride been like?

I started my career in mining in 2013 at Hunter Valley Operations with ResCo services and then Programmed, when I was 19 as a Trainee Haul Truck Operator. I started out working through different crews on the crib relief roster and eventually progressed to my crew that I'm in now. During my time in the pit I also obtained my trainer and assessor certificate to complete training and assessing on crew for new starters. The most recent journey of my mining career was having the opportunity to work with the dispatch team here at HVO which began about 17 months ago. Initially I was given the opportunity to be a step up for the crew but got given the opportunity to have a full-time gig in dispatch. Since the start of the year I became permanent with HVO, so I could say that the ride has been a pretty good one so far!

What's a usual day at work entail?

Every day in dispatch is different! After a quick hand over with the outgoing crew and phone calls with our pit supervisors about the day its GO GO GO as soon as you put your headset on and sit in the chair. Our day involves managing the haul truck and shovel fleet efficiently according to the mine plan and priorities as well as crew management, fatigue management and communication to pit supervisors and crew.

MY MINING LIFE

How big is the crew?

166 people with multiple skills including truck, shovel, excavator, dozer, grader, loader and drills. What's the best thing about your job?

I would have to say the challenge and every day is different in dispatch. My team of three that I work with in the office are amazing as well as the crew out in the pit.

The worst thing?

Shift work. But I wouldn't have got what I have today without this job, so you have to take the bad with the good.

What's a funny story about work that you can tell? I can't recall any funny stories, but night shift is

fun sometimes when the fatigue kicks in and we get a bit delirious and have a bit of banter amongst each other in the office.

How different is your job to what you wanted to be when you were a kid?

I'm not sure... but I was always fascinated by big trucks as a kid so you could say I've got to do that but bigger than I ever imagined and about 400 tones heavier.

What would your mum say about you when you were a kid?

Probably nothing bad, I'm the baby so I was probably a little spoilt.



Domestic Violence is a social issue that can impact anyone, from friends and families to the workplace and wider community. It is an issue that needs to be tackled head on, and that's exactly what Singleton Family Support Services are doing.

The coal mining industry is one of the largest employers in the Hunter Valley, with 86% of the industry being male. The Toolbox Talks program has been designed to engage and educate men about violence against women in safe and interactive training sessions. One of the most important learnings of the program is how men and women can get involved to prevent domestic violence, through awareness and the strength to speak up.



TEN TEAMS COMPETED AT THE 2019 HUNTER VALLEY OPEN CUT MINES RESCUE COMPETITION WITH PEABODY'S WAMBO TEAM TAKING THE TITLE.

Nine teams from across the Hunter Valley and one Queensland team were put under pressure at this year's annual open cut mines rescue competition, which was held at Bengalla Mine on September 13.

The teams worked their way through a complex series of simulated emergencies including fire fighting, light and heavy vehicle collisions. vertical rescues, high voltage rescue, general and industrial first aid, heavy lifting and application of knowledge via a theory test.

Teams put in significant training in the lead up to the fiercely contested event, with Peabody's Wambo team named the best team on the day, closely followed by Thiess Glencore's Mt Owen Team. The other competing teams were Glendell, Jeebropilly, Mount Thorley Operations, Ravensworth, Mangoola, Bulga, Liddell and Whitehaven.

THE WINNING WAMBO CAPTAIN, MICK TURNER WAS BOTH THRILLED AND VERY HUMBLED WHEN ASKED TO COMMENT ON THE RESULT.

"It was both surprising and fantastic. We went into the event with a very positive mindset and saw the competition, regardless of the outcome, as an opportunity to learn, test and improve our skills," Mick said.

"I was very proud of the efforts of the team. I couldn't have asked for anymore, they should be commended for their commitment to the task at hand on the day, and their preparation and training into the lead up of the competition. We had two relatively inexperienced team members, so this win is a real reflection on the efforts of

Wambo, Micheal Alexander.

"Despite the industry making significant technological advances to enhance mine safety, we will always require the human element in an emergency. We hope to never see a significant incident at our mine, but the Wambo Open Cut Emergency Response Team have demonstrated they have the winning formula should we need to call on them.'

"I congratulate the team led by Mick Turner and am happy to see them build on the success of our Wambo Underground Mines Rescue team. It's a testament to the strong safety culture and commitment to looking after your mates that extends across all mining operations at our Wambo complex."

WHEN ASKED ABOUT THE IMPORTANCE OF EVENTS LIKE THIS ONE, DAVID CONNELL, HUNTER **VALLEY MINES RESCUE REGIONAL** MANAGER ECHOED THE COMMENTS OF THE WAMBO CAPTAIN, AND THEIR **ACTING GENERAL MANAGER.**

"It's a testament to today's mining operations and the skills of emergency response teams across NSW that the number of major incidents are limited," he said.

"The specialised skills of the men and women who competed at the event also transcends their workplaces. They provide not only day to day safety leadership at site, but their training and associated benefits extend deep into our communities, with team members also fulfilling roles as fire fighters, medical leaders at sports clubs, and the like."



SUPERBIKE STAR

BORN AND BRED IN NULKABA, NSW MATT WALTERS HAS BEEN RACING MOTORBIKES SINCE HE WAS 5 AND NOW RACES THE 2019 AUSTRALIAN SUPERBIKE SERIES.

At age 5 Matt's parents took him down to the local minibike club at Kurri Kurri and after watching his friends race knew he wanted to do the same.

Coming from a family of racing enthusiasts - his parents always around fast cars, bikes, boats, sprint cars or speedway bikes - jumping on the bike was natural to Matt.

With his brother Mitch also into racing, his family has been the biggest support along the way including his father-in-law. "If there is anyone at Wambo Coal reading this, please tell my father-inlaw John Blackham to have a good day at work," Matt laughed.





ON A LONELY STRETCH OF ROAD IN THE SCOTTISH HIGHLANDS, THERE'S A SOLITARY, WHITEWASHED COTTAGE AT THE FOOT OF A GREAT HILL. A WIDE, ROCKY RIVER WINDS PAST THE FRONT OF THE SMALL HUT AND DISAPPEARS INTO A VALLEY OF STEEP PEAKS AND GRASSY MOORS. THIS IS LAGANGARBH HUT IN THE GLENCOE VALLEY, AND IT EPITOMISES EVERYTHING THAT IS ROMANTIC AND WILD ABOUT THE HIGHLANDS.

To see it, you'll need to take Scotland's scenic A82 highway – a road that will take you through the aweinspiring valley, past Loch Ness and the small town of Drumnadrochit, and through to Inverness and the Culloden Battlefield.

The Glencoe Valley is as awe-inspiring as you'd expect Scottish wilderness to be. Wide open, alpine moors give way to rugged, rock-strewn mountains. In winter, these peaks are covered in snow; in spring, they're covered in small, purple wildflowers.

The cottage itself was thought to be a 'crofter's' hut. Crofting was a style of farming particular to the Scottish Highlands, where the better land held individual crofts, and the less fertile areas were shared by the community for grazing. The produce or profits would also be shared.

In keeping with Scotland's warlike history, Glencoe was also the scene of a massacre back in 1692. It's infamous not for its death-toll, (which was 38), but because the soldiers who carried out the killings had been offered the hospitality of the clan for 12 days beforehand.

The National Trust for Scotland Glencoe Visitors' Centre commemorates this massacre in an exhibition, and also has a viewing platform and ranger information.

CONTINUE ALONG THE A82 AND YOU'LL PASS THROUGH FORT WILLIAM, SCOTLAND'S 'OUTDOOR ADVENTURE CAPITAL', AND SEE BEN NEVIS – SCOTLAND'S TALLEST MOUNTAIN.

Just over 100 kilometres from Glencoe, on the Northern edge of the great Loch Ness, you'll reach a small village called Drumnadrochit. It's so small, in fact, that most maps of the area don't even show it.

It has a population of just over 1,000 people, but despite its size, Drumnadrochit is still a tourist draw, partly because of the Loch's infamous resident, 'Nessie', the Loch Ness Monster.

If you believe the tales about 'Nessie', you'll know that she lives somewhere in that 36 kilometre, 227m deep stretch of water.

BUT WHAT IS NESSIE, AND DOES SHE REALLY EXIST?

Anything you want to know about the elusive 'monster' can be found at one of Drumnadrochit's two Nessie exhibitions.

'Nessieland' features eleven different 'caves' – interactive rooms – that explore the Loch's history and geography, and of course the varying theories about Nessie herself.

The Loch Ness Centre and Exhibition has seven themed areas and uses multi-media presentations to take visitors through the history and legends of the Loch.

If you fancy your chances at spotting Nessie yourself, you can book a cruise on the 'Nessie Hunter', with Loch Ness Cruises. The boat is equipped with Radar, Colour Sonar an even GPS to help passengers pinpoint the shy creature.
